CONSULTATION REPORT



INTRODUCTION

Each year Council must prepare an Annual Budget which outlines the financial and non financial resources that Council requires to achieve the strategic objectives as described in the Council Plan.

In 2023-24 the budget was allocated as follows:

\$58.33m Capital Works	\$22.18m Parks, community facilities, sport and recreation	\$16.82m Libraries, arts, culture and community events
\$29.10m Buildings, roads, traffic management and drainage maintenance	\$20.81m Planning, building and regulatory services	\$15.33m Health, aged and community services
\$28.07m Waste collection, street and public facilities cleaning	\$16.71m Families, children and youth	\$5.89m Customer service and communication

As part of this process Council undergoes a community consultation phase in line with the Community Engagement Policy. The feedback received from the community is then used to inform Councillors and Council Officers and assist with the allocation of resources throughout the budget process.

CONSULTATION PROCESS








Activities

The consultation process was conducted from 30 October until 26 November 2023 and incorporated both online and hard copy activities (outlined below) to ensure a range of methods to participate were offered to the community. 36 people participated over the 28 day period, 29 used the online Social Pinpoint tool, six respondents emailed their feedback and one community member submitted a hard copy form.

PROMOTION

- Media release and follow-up with Dandenong Journal
- Paid advertisement in the local paper

SUMMARY

WHO PARTICIPATED?

The majority of the respondents who registered their suburb were from Noble Park (40%), Dandenong (20%) and Springvale (20%). The remainder of respondents were from Keysborough, Springvale South and Noble Park North. This was a change on the previous year where most respondents were from Keysborough South (39%).

WHAT SERVICES WERE SEEN TO BE MOST IMPORTANT?

The survey results showed that the top five services which are still the most important to residents are:

- Roads and footpaths
- · Rubbish and recycling
- Parks and gardens
- Libraries, and
- Street lighting

SUMMARY

WHAT WOULD OUR COMMUNITY LIKE TO SEE MORE OF?

Respondents to the survey highlighted that they would like to see more of the following:

- · Public lighting
- Cycling and walking paths
- Playgrounds, parks and sportsgrounds
- Affordable housing

Festivals and events, arts and cultural exhibitions and children, youth and family services were seen to be adequately provided for.

SPENDING - LESS, THE SAME OR MORE?


Planning, building and regulatory services, along with libraries, arts, culture and community facilities were highlighted as the areas that Council should consider spending less on.

Areas where more spending could occur included health, aged and community services; and buildings, roads, traffic management and drainage maintenance.


CONSULTATION ACTIVITIES

IDEAS WALL

The Ideas Wall was a way for participants to post ideas publicly, read what other community members were saying and vote on the ideas they most agreed with.



The comments were tagged in the following categories:




Comments were related to the following topics within each category:

- Ideas and suggestions (14) more trees, dumped rubbish, educational programs for health and wellbeing, more disable parking, community programs for domestic violence, inclusive and accessible outdoor environments.
- Parks and Playgrounds (3) accessible playgrounds for children with different abilities, age friendly landscapes and Barry Powell Basketball Court.
- Transport (8) safe parking for bikes and cars, new bike paths, improving transport access to Springvale, sound barriers and transport advocacy.
- Community Facilities (5) more playgroups and parent groups, essential safety features near primary schools, affordable child care and continued work on the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre.
- Climate Change (4) Citizen Science projects, funding for sustainability, environment and climate change related initiatives and education, reduction in the concrete jungle.

PRIORITISATION ACTIVITY



The budget prioritisation activity was designed to show the community that Council often has to choose some services/activities/initiatives to fund over others and this involves prioritising what the community is in most need of along with what Council can afford.

Participants were asked to choose five key areas they would like to see Council focus on in the next budget out of a total of eight. These areas are aligned with the strategic objectives of the Council Plan 2021–25. The above pie chart shows all of the results, with the following areas being the top two priorities:

- Accessible neighbourhoods walking and cycling paths, access to public transport and well-designed public spaces
- Social connection support for people with a disability, services for children, young people and families; increasing participation for older residents; and community safety.

In comparison, last year's consultation listed the top three priorities as accessible neighbourhoods, investment in the community, and health and wellbeing.

SURVEY


An online survey was designed to capture a variety of ideas and suggestions. This survey was also reproduced as a hard copy for anyone who could not access it online. Of the 17 survey responses only one of these was a hard copy.

The survey asked some key questions to better understand the needs of the community. These were:


- 1. What services are the most important to you?

A summary of the responses is in the below graphs.


Which suburb do you live in?




What services are the most important to you?

EMAIL RESPONSES

Six community members submitted their feedback via email. The key focus of five of the submissions was a need to increase the resourcing for environmental sustainability staff and initiatives.

A sixth submission was made related to a number of initiatives including:

- School and pedestrian crossings
- Footpath infrastructure
- Bus shelters and seating
- Increased tree planting
- Mental Health outreach/suicide preventon

"Attract investments from private investors in Real Estate & Business to increase jobs."

"With an aging population, it's important to provide services for the elderly to allow them to age at-home with dignity.

Additionally, waste management is crucial for keeping our streets beautiful."

"Strategies for building a better and healthier future for all. Eg. Ways to increase greening, to build sustainable neighbourhoods, to increase green spacesin order to balance out the various negative impacts of expansive high density commercial locations and industrial estates."



"A budget priority should be the environment, both ongoing staffing and project funding."

NEXT STEPS

The results of the consultation have been shared with the Executive Management Team and Councillors for consideration during the development of Council's Budget for 2024–25.

The feedback will also be considered as part of the review of the Council Plan and development of the Annual Plan 2024–25.

Council's Budget 2024-25 and Annual Plan 2024-25 process will be conducted in early 2024 and the final plans endorsed by Council in June.
