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COUNCIL OBLIGATIONS AND AGENDA REPORTS

Council has several obligations in relation to its Community Vision, Council Plan, Instruments of Legislation and Council policy. These are summarily considered in each Agenda report and further details are added as required. The obligations are as follows:

Community Vision 2040 (Community Vision | Greater Dandenong Council)

After consultation with the Greater Dandenong community on what kind of future they wanted for themselves and our city, the Greater Dandenong People's Panel developed a new Community Vision for 2040:

The City of Greater Dandenong is a home to all. It's a city where you can enjoy and embrace life through celebration and equal opportunity. We harmonise the community by valuing multiculturalism and the individual. Our community is healthy, vibrant, innovative and creative. Our growing city is committed to environmental sustainability. Welcome to our exciting and peaceful community.

Reports in this Agenda will identify when any of the above principles are relevant.

The Council Plan 2021-25 (Council Plan 2021-25 | Greater Dandenong Council)

The Council Plan describes the kind of future the Council is working for, and how Council will do this over four years. The Council Plan has the following key strategic objectives:

- A socially connected, safe and healthy city
- A city that respects and celebrates diversity, our history and the arts
- A city of accessible, vibrant centres and neighbourhoods
- A green city committed to a sustainable future
- A city that supports entrepreneurship, quality education and employment outcomes
- A Council that demonstrates leadership and a commitment to investing in the community.

The Overarching Governance Principles of the Local Government Act 2020

Section 9 of the *Local Government Act* 2020 states that a Council must in the performance of its role give effect to the overarching governance principles. These are:

- a) Council decisions are to be made and actions taken in accordance with the relevant law;
- b) priority is to be given to achieving the best outcomes for the municipal community, including future generations;
- c) the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the municipal district, including mitigation and planning for climate change risks, is to be promoted;
- d) the municipal community is to be engaged in strategic planning and strategic decision making;
- e) innovation and continuous improvement are to be pursued;
- f) collaboration with other Councils and Governments and statutory bodies is to be sought;
- g) the ongoing financial viability of the Council is to be ensured;
- h) regional, state and national plans and policies are to be taken into account in strategic planning and decision making;
- i) the transparency of Council decisions, actions and information is to be ensured.

Also, in giving effect to the overarching governance principles above, a Council must take into account the following supporting principles:

- a) the community engagement principles (section 56);
- b) the public transparency principles (section 58);
- c) the strategic planning principles (section 89);
- d) the financial management principles (section 101);
- e) the service performance principles (section 106).

Reports in this Agenda will identify when any of the above principles are relevant.



The Gender Equality Act 2020

The *Gender Equality Act 2020* came into operation on 31 March 2021 and requires councils to take positive action towards achieving workplace gender equality and to promote gender equality in their policies, programs and services. The objects of the Act are as follows:

- a) to promote, encourage and facilitate the achievement of gender equality and improvement in the status of women; and
- b) to support the identification and elimination of systemic causes of gender inequality in policy, programs and delivery of services in workplaces and communities; and
- c) to recognise that gender inequality may be compounded by other forms of disadvantage or discrimination that a person may experience on the basis of Aboriginality, age, disability, ethnicity, gender identity, race, religion, sexual orientation and other attributes; and
- d) to redress disadvantage, address stigma, stereotyping, prejudice and violence, and accommodate persons of different genders by way of structural change; and
- e) to enhance economic and social participation by persons of different genders; and
- f) to further promote the right to equality set out in the Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women.

Council is obligated to think about how its programs and services affect different people and different communities and how we can avoid reinforcing unintentional inequalities. Reports authors must consider the requirements of the *Gender Equality Act* 2020 and Council's Diversity, Access and Equity Policy when asking Council to consider or review any issues which have a direct or significant impact on members of the Greater Dandenong community.

Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities

Council, Councillors and members of Council staff are a public authority under the *Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities Act* 2006 and, as such, are all responsible to act in accordance with the *Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities* 2006 (the Charter). The Charter is founded on the following principles:

- human rights are essential in a democratic and inclusive society that respects the rule of law, human dignity, equality and freedom;
- human rights belong to all people without discrimination, and the diversity of the people of Victoria enhances our community;
- human rights come with responsibilities and must be exercised in a way that respects the human rights of others;
- human rights have a special importance for the Aboriginal people of Victoria, as descendants of Australia's first people, with their diverse spiritual, social, cultural and economic relationship with their traditional lands and waters.

Given this municipality's diversity and inclusiveness, when developing or preparing a report for Council consideration, report authors are required to ensure their report is consistent with the standards set by the Charter.



Consideration of Climate Change and Sustainability

One of the overarching governance principles of the *Local Government Act* 2020 is that the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the municipal district, including mitigation and planning for climate change risks, is to be promoted.

In January 2020, this Council joined a growing number of cities around Australia and declared a "Climate and Ecological Emergency" and committed this Council to emergency action on climate change. Council has developed a Climate Change Emergency Strategy and Action Plan 2020-30 to help the City of Greater Dandenong become a resilient, net zero carbon emission city with an active community prepared for the challenges of changing climate.

When developing or preparing a report for Council consideration, report authors are required to consider what impacts their issue has on Council's Declaration on a Climate and Ecological Emergency, Council's Climate Change Emergency Strategy and the requirements of the *Local Government Act* 2020 in relation to the overarching principle on climate change and sustainability.

Executive Summary

1. Under the *Local Government Act* 2020, each Council is a body corporate and a legal entity in its own right. Each Council must therefore have a common seal (like any corporate entity) that is an official sanction of that Council. Sealing a document makes it an official document of Council as a corporate body. Documents that require sealing include agreements, contracts, leases or any other contractual or legally binding document that binds Council to another party.

- 1. This application is brought before the Council as it has received four (4) objections.
- 2. The application proposes the development of the land for three (3) double storey dwellings.
- 3. A permit is required under the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme pursuant to:
 - Clause 32.08-7 General Residential Zone, Schedule 1 to construct two or more dwellings on a lot.

Objectors Summary

- 4. The application was advertised to the surrounding area through the erection of a notice on-site and the mailing of notices to adjoining and surrounding owners and occupiers. Four (4) objections were received to the application. Issues raised generally relate to matters of:
 - Overdevelopment/too many dwellings;
 - Inconsistent with the existing neighbourhood character;
 - Loss of landscaping and removal of existing canopy trees;
 - Inadequate parking provided; and
 - Increased traffic along the street.

Assessment Summary

5. The site is located within an established residential area and is well suited for medium density housing, given that the site is zoned for Incremental Change. The proposal seeks to provide a medium density development which is consistent with the emerging pattern of development and surrounding neighbourhood character.



6. The development complies with Clause 55, responding to the site context and the site circumstances, whilst respecting the existing and preferred neighbourhood character envisaged by Clause 22.09.

Recommendation Summary

7. As assessed, the proposal is consistent with and appropriately responds to the provisions of the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme. The proposal appropriately responds to strategic policy for residential development for the area with this report recommending that the application be supported, and a Notice of Decision (which provides appeal rights to objectors) to grant a permit be issued containing the conditions as set out in the recommendation. If the application was to be appealed to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT), it is the officer's view that it is highly likely that VCAT would also issue a planning permit for this proposal.

Subject Site and Surrounds

Subject Site

- 8. The subject site is located on the western side of Shepreth Avenue.
- 9. The land is rectangular in shape with a frontage of 16.15 metres, a length of 39.51 metres and a total land area of 638 square metres.
- 10. The site is currently vacant, and devoid of any built forms and vegetation.
- 11. Vehicle access to the site is provided via an existing crossover on Shepreth Avenue, located adjacent the southern boundary.
- 12. A 2.44 metre wide drainage and sewerage easement is located along the side (south) boundary.
- 13. The site is generally flat in topography, with a rise of 0.8 metres from the front to the rear of the site.

Surrounding Area

- 14. The site and surrounding land are located within the General Residential Zone, Schedule 1.
- 15. The surrounding development is a mixture of single and double storey in height.
- 16. Immediately adjoining the site to the west is no. 63 Thomas Street Noble Park, which is used and developed for an aged care facility.
- 17. Double storey multi-unit development exists within close proximity to the subject site, located at:
 - No. 1 Norris Street, containing three (3) double storey dwellings and one (1) single storey dwelling.
 - No. 17 Shepreth Avenue, containing two (2) double storey dwellings and one (1) single storey dwelling.
 - No. 13 Norris Street, containing two (2) double storey dwellings and one (1) single storey dwelling.

18. The Noble Park Activity Centre is located 590 metres to the north-west.

Background

Previous Applications

21. A search of Council records revealed that Council has previously considered the following planning applications for the site:

Planning permit application ref. no.	Proposal	Outcome

- 22. The previous permit application PLN22/0006 proposed the development of the land for three (3) double storey dwellings and was refused by Council's delegate, with no permit to be granted. The decision was then upheld within a VCAT decision. The grounds of refusal centred around the following concerns as follows:
 - Two single width crossovers proposed on a lot width of less than 17 metres;
 - Lack of landscaping opportunities within the front setback; and
 - Overdominance of car parking within the front setback.



Subject Application

- 23. The current application PLN23/0567 was lodged after the VCAT Order and has responded to all concerns that formed the decision to refuse the granting of a permit.
- 24. The design response was updated as follows:
 - To utilise the existing single width crossover connecting to Shepreth Avenue, with no additional accessways proposed for the development.
 - The front setback is now limited in hard surfacing and paving, with no car spaces proposed within the front setback
 - The area afforded to landscaping within the front setback now provides the development with landscaped character that is compatible with the existing and emerging neighbourhood character along Shepreth Avenue.

25. The application proposes the development of the land for three (3) double storey dwellings, as follows:

Financial Implications

27. There are no financial implications associated with this report.

Planning Scheme and Policy Frameworks

- 28. Pursuant to the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme, a planning permit is required:
 - Under Clause 32.08-7 General Residential Zone Schedule 1 to construct two or more dwellings on a lot.
- 29. The relevant controls and policies are as follows:

Zoning Controls

- 30. The subject site is located in a General Residential Zone, Schedule 1, as is the surrounding area.
- 31. The purposes of the General Residential Zone, outlined at Clause 32.08, are:
 - To implement the State Planning Policy Framework and the Local Planning Policy Framework, including the Municipal Strategic Statement and local planning policies.
 - To encourage development that respects the neighbourhood character of the area.



- To encourage a diversity of housing types and housing growth particularly in locations offering good access to services and transport.
- To allow educational, recreational, religious, community and a limited range of other nonresidential uses to serve local community needs in appropriate locations.
- 32. Within Schedule 1 to the General Residential Zone, a variation of requirements to Clause 55 are set out as follows:
 - Standard B6 (Street setback) As per B6 or 7.5 metres, whichever is lesser.
 - Standard B9 (Permeability) *Minimum 30%.*
 - Standard B13 (Landscaping) 70% of ground level front setback, and side and rear setbacks, planted with substantial landscaping and canopy trees.
 - Standard B28 (Private Open Space) An area of 50 square metres, with one part to consist of secluded private open space at the side or rear of the dwelling or dwelling with a minimum area of 30 square metres, a minimum dimension of 5 metres and convenient access from a living room; or, a balcony with a minimum area of 10 square metres with a minimum width of 2 metres and convenient access from a living room; or, a roof-top area of 10 square metres with a minimum width of 2 metres and convenient access from a living room.
 - Standard B32 (Front Fence Height) Maximum 1.5 metre height in streets in a Transport Zone 2; 1.2 metre maximum height for other streets.

Overlay Controls

33. No overlays affect the subject site or surrounding area.

State Planning Policy Framework

- 34. The **Operation of the Planning Policy Framework** outlined at Clause 71.02 seeks to ensure that the objectives of planning in Victoria are fostered through appropriate land use and development planning policies and practices which integrate relevant environmental, social and economic factors in the interests of net community benefit and sustainable development.
- 35. In order to achieve these objectives, there are a number of more specific objectives contained within the Planning Policy Framework that need to be considered under this application.
- 36. **Clause 11 (Settlement)** encourages planning to facilitate sustainable development that takes full advantage of existing settlement patterns and investment in transport, utility, social, community and commercial infrastructure and services. It also encourages planning to contribute towards diversity of choice, energy efficiency, a high standard of urban design and amenity, and land use and transport integration.
- 37. Further guidance is provided by **Clause 11.01-1R (Settlement)**, which seeks to promote the sustainable growth and development of Victoria and deliver choice and opportunity for all Victorians through a network of settlements. It includes strategies to develop compact urban areas that are based around existing or planned activity centres to maximise accessibility to facilities and services.
- 38. **Clause 15 (Built Environment and Heritage)** states that planning is to recognise the role of urban design, building design, heritage and energy and resource efficiency in delivering liveable and sustainable cities, towns and neighbourhoods.



- 39. It adds that planning should ensure all land use and development appropriately responds to its surrounding landscape and character, valued built form and cultural context. Planning should promote development that is environmentally sustainable and should minimise detrimental impacts on the built and natural environment.
- 40. According to the clause, planning should promote excellence in the built environment and create places that:
 - Are enjoyable, engaging and comfortable to be in.
 - Accommodate people of abilities, ages and cultures.
 - Contribute positively to local character and sense of place.
 - Reflect the particular characteristics and cultural identity of the community.
 - Enhance the function, amenity and safety of the public realm.
- 41. These overall objectives are reinforced by a number of sub-clauses, including **Clause 15.01-1S (Urban design)** and **Clause 15.01-1R (Urban design Metropolitan Melbourne)**, which seek to create urban environments that are safe, healthy, functional and enjoyable and that contribute to a sense of place and cultural identity.
- 42. **Clause 15.01-2S (Building design)** aims to achieve building design outcomes that contribute positively to the local context and enhance the public realm, while Clause 15.01-5S (Neighbourhood character) has an objective to recognise, support and protect neighbourhood character, cultural identity, and sense of place.
- 43. Clause 15.01-4S (Healthy neighbourhoods) has an objective to achieve neighbourhoods that foster healthy and active living and community wellbeing. Clause 15.01-4R (Healthy neighbourhoods Metropolitan Melbourne) reinforces this, with a strategy to create a city of 20-minute neighbourhoods that give people the ability to meet most of their everyday needs within a 20-minute walk, cycle or local public transport trip from their home.
- 44. **Clause 16 (Housing)** contains two key objectives, which can be summarised as relating to housing diversity, sustainability of housing and the provision of land for affordable housing.
- 45. These objectives are reinforced by a number of sub-clauses, including **Clause 16.01-1S** (Housing Supply), which seeks to facilitate well-located, integrated and diverse housing that meets community needs, and **Clause 16.01-2S** (Housing affordability) which seeks to deliver more affordable housing closer to jobs, transport and services.
- 46. Clause 16.01-1R (Housing supply Metropolitan Melbourne), includes several strategies to manage the supply of new housing including increased housing in established areas to create a city of 20-minute neighbourhoods close to existing services, jobs, public transport; as well as a strategy that allows for a range of minimal, incremental and high change residential areas that balance the need to protect valued areas with the need to ensure choice and growth in housing.
- 47. **Clause 18.01-1S (Land use and transport planning)** has a strategy to plan urban development to make jobs and community services more accessible by ensuring access is provided to developments in accordance with forecast demand, taking advantage of all available modes of transport and to minimise adverse impacts on existing transport networks and the amenity of surrounding areas.



Local Planning Policy Framework

- 48. The Local Planning Policy Framework (LPPF) includes the Municipal Strategic Statement (MSS) and Local Policies.
- 49. The MSS is contained within Clause 21 of the Scheme. The MSS at **Clause 21.02** focuses on the Municipal Profile, within which the following is noted:
 - There is considerable diversity within Greater Dandenong's housing stock. Most housing stock is aged between 30 to 50 years old, though there are some areas with dwellings in excess of 100 years old. Areas of newer housing are located in the north-east and central-southern areas, with in-fill development occurring across the municipality (Clause 21.02-3).
 - Higher density housing is generally located in proximity to railway stations and major shopping centres, in particular in central Dandenong (Clause 21.02-3).
 - Whilst there is a clear pre-dominance of single detached dwellings, there are a range of other types of dwellings including dual occupancies, villa-units, town houses and apartments. The highest concentration of older villa units and apartments and more recent multi-unit redevelopments have occurred around central Dandenong, Springvale and Noble Park activity centres (Clause 21.02-4).
 - With diverse cultural groups that call Greater Dandenong home, there are certain distinct precincts that are emerging that have their own character. Their built form is characterised by buildings with flat unarticulated facades, prominent balconies, limited frontage/side setbacks, limited or no landscaping (Clause 21.02-4).
- 50. A Vision for Greater Dandenong is outlined at **Clause 21.03.** The vision is that Greater Dandenong will be a municipality where housing diversity and choice is promoted in its various attractive neighbourhoods.
- 51. The objectives and strategies of the MSS are under four (4) main themes including: land use; built form; open space and natural environment; and, infrastructure and transportation (considered individually under Clauses 21.04 to 21.07). Of particular relevance to this application are Clauses 21.04 Land Use and 21.05 Built Form:
- 52. Clause 21.04-1 Housing and community:
 - Greater Dandenong's population is expected to rise by 22 percent, from 147,000 to 179,000 in the decade to 2024, placing pressure on transport networks, infrastructure, services and public open space.
 - Approximately 9,950 new households will need to be accommodated across the municipality by 2024 (Greater Dandenong Housing Strategy 2014-2024).
 - Supporting urban consolidation and providing housing in existing areas close to activity centres means that people do not need to travel as far to work, shop or to take part in sports/leisure activities thus reducing the environmental impacts of transport.
 - Increases in housing density must be balanced by adequate provision of open space, good urban design and improvements to the public realm.
 - Encourage the provision of housing that is adaptable to support the needs of the changing needs of present and future residents.
 - Encourage innovative redevelopment and renewal of deteriorating housing stock and older styled higher-density apartments and multi-unit developments.



- Encourage new residential development that incorporates adequate space for the planting and the long term viability and safe retention of canopy trees.
- Respect the valued, existing neighbourhood character within incremental and minimal change areas.
- Requiring medium-density developments to be site and locality responsive and to respect existing and proposed neighbourhood character.
- 53. **Clause 21.05-1** Urban design, character, streetscapes and landscapes contains the following relevant objectives and strategies:
- 54. To facilitate high quality building design and architecture.
 - Ensure building design is consistent with the identified future character of an area and fully integrates with surrounding environment.
 - Encourage high standards of building design and architecture, which allows for flexibility and adaptation in use.
 - Encourage innovative architecture and building design.
 - Encourage development to incorporate sustainable design elements that enhance occupant comfort and environmental performance.
- 55. To facilitate high quality development, which has regard for the surrounding environment and built form.
 - Promote views of high-quality landscapes and pleasing vistas from both the public and private realm.
 - Promote all aspects of character physical, environmental, social and cultural.
 - Encourage planting and landscape themes, which complement and improve the environment.
 - Encourage developments to provide for canopy trees.
 - Recognising valued existing neighbourhood character and promoting identified future character as defined in the Residential Development and Neighbourhood Character Policy at Clause 22.09.

56. To protect and improve streetscapes.

- Ensure that new developments improve streetscapes through generous landscape setbacks and canopy tree planting.
- Ensure landscaping within private property that complements and improves the streetscapes and landscaping of public areas.
- 57. To ensure landscaping that enhances the built environment.
 - Encourage new developments to establish a landscape setting, which reflects the local and wider landscape character.
 - Encourage landscaping that integrates canopy trees and an appropriate mix of shrubs and ground covers and complements and integrates with existing or proposed landscaping in public areas.



- 58. Clause 22.09 Residential Development & Neighbourhood Character Policy contains the following objectives at Clause 22.09-2:
 - To guide the location and design of different types of residential development within Greater Dandenong, having regard to State and local planning policies, while respecting the valued characteristics and identified future character of residential neighbourhoods.
 - To ensure that new residential development is consistent with the identified future character and preferred built form envisaged for the three Future Change Areas.
 - To provide certainty about which areas are identified for, or protected from, increased residential development consistent with the purpose of the applicable zone.
 - To facilitate high quality, well designed residential development and on-site landscaping.
 - To promote a range of housing types to accommodate the future needs of the municipality's changing population.
- 59. To ensure that residential development uses innovative, responsive and functional siting and design solutions that:
 - a) Achieve high quality internal amenity and private open space outcomes for future residents;
 - b) Make a positive contribution to the streetscape through quality design, contextual responsiveness and visual interest;
 - c) Promote public realm safety by maximising passive surveillance;
 - d) Demonstrate responsiveness to the site, adjoining interfaces, streetscape and landscape context;
 - e) Respect the amenity of adjoining residents and the reasonable development potential of adjoining properties;
 - f) Achieve environmentally sustainable design outcomes;
 - g) Use quality, durable building materials that are integrated into the overall building form and façade; and
 - h) Minimise the visual dominance of vehicle accessways and storage facilities, such as garages, car ports and basement entrances.
- 60. Clause 22.09-3.1 (Design Principles) provides design principles, which apply to all Future Change Areas.
- 61. Clause 22.09-3.3 (Incremental Change Areas) provides design principles, some of which also relate to the variances to the requirements of standards to Clause 55 under the schedule to the General Residential Zone. The guidelines consider matters such as the preferred housing type, building height, landscaping, setbacks, front boundary and width, private open space and bulk and built form.
- 62. An assessment of Clause 22.09 is included at Attachment 3 to this report.



Particular Provisions

- 63. Car Parking (Clause 52.06) is relevant to this application.
- 64. The purposes of this provision are:
 - To ensure that car parking is provided in accordance with the Municipal Planning Strategy and the Planning Policy Framework.
 - To ensure the provision of an appropriate number of car parking spaces having regard to the demand likely to be generated, the activities on the land and the nature of the locality.
 - To support sustainable transport alternatives to the motor car.
 - To promote the efficient use of car parking spaces through the consolidation of car parking facilities.
 - To ensure that car parking does not adversely affect the amenity of the locality.
 - To ensure that the design and location of car parking is of a high standard, creates a safe environment for users and enables easy and efficient use.
- 65. Clause 52.06-2 notes that a new use must not commence, or the floor area of an existing use must not be increased until the required car spaces have been provided on the land.
- 66. The required spaces are identified in the table to Clause 52.06-5. Clause 52.06-3 further notes that a permit may be granted to reduce or waive the number of car spaces required by the table.
- 67. The site is not within the Principal Public Transport Network. Therefore, the car parking rate in Column A of 52.06-5 is applicable.
- 68. The table in Column A at Clause 52.06-5 notes that a dwelling with 1 or 2 bedrooms requires 1 car space and a dwelling with 3 or more bedrooms requires 2 spaces to each dwelling. 1 visitor car space is required for visitors to every 5 dwellings for developments of 5 or more dwellings.
- 69. Car parking is to be designed and constructed in accordance with the requirements of Clause 52.06-9 and 52.06-11 of the Scheme.
- 70. An assessment against Clause 52.06 is included as Attachment 4 to this report.
- 71. Clause 55 Two or more dwellings on a lot and residential buildings is relevant to this application.
- 72. Pursuant to Clause 55 of the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme, the provisions of this Clause apply to an application:
 - To construct two or more dwellings on a lot.



73. The purposes of Clause 55 are:

- To implement the Municipal Planning Strategy and the Planning Policy Framework.
- To achieve residential development that respects the existing neighbourhood character, or which contributes to a preferred neighbourhood character.
- To encourage residential development that provides reasonable standards of amenity for existing and new residents.
- To encourage residential development that is responsive to the site and the neighbourhood.

74. A development:

- Must meet all of the objectives of this clause.
- Should meet all of the standards of this clause.
- 75. If a zone or a schedule to a zone specifies a requirement of a standard different from a requirement set out in this clause, the requirement in the zone or a schedule to the zone applies.
- 76. An assessment against Clause 55 is included at Attachment 5 of this report.

General Provisions

77. Clause 65 – Decision Guidelines need to be considered, as is the case with all applications. For this application the requirements of Clause 65.01 for the approval of an application or plan are of relevance. This Clause outlines the requirements that the responsible authority must consider when determining the application.

Restrictive Covenants

78. No covenants or Section 173 agreements are registered on the Certificate of Title for the subject site.

Links to the Community Vision and Council Plan

79. The Council Plan describes the kind of future the Council is working for, and how Council will do this over four years. In accordance with the commitment in Council's Annual Plan, all applications are considered on their merits.

Diversity, Access and Equity

80. It is not considered that the planning assessment of this application raises any diversity issues. The application itself does not have a direct and significant impact on the wider Greater Dandenong community.

Community Safety

81. It is considered that there would be no adverse community safety implications in permitting the proposal subject to strict conditions on any planning permit issued.



Safe Design Guidelines

82. Consideration of the relevant requirements of these Guidelines has been undertaken within the Assessment of this application.

Referrals

- 83. The application was not required to be referred to any external referral authorities pursuant to section 55 of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987.
- 84. The application was internally referred to the following Council departments for their consideration. The comments provided were considered in the assessment of the application.

Advertising

- 85. The application has been advertised pursuant to section 52 of the *Planning and Environment Act* 1987, by:
 - sending notices to the owners and occupiers of adjoining land; and
 - placing one (1) sign on site facing Shepreth Avenue.
- 86. The notification has been carried out correctly.
- 87. A total of four (4) submissions were received to the application.
- 88. The location of objectors/submitters is shown in Attachment 2 to this report.

Summary of Grounds of Submissions/Objections

- 89. The objections are summarised below (**bold**), followed by the Town Planner's Response (*italics*).
- 90. Overdevelopment/too many dwellings

The size and scale of the development is consistent with the preferred neighbourhood character set out in Clause 22.09 and complies with objectives of Clause 55 of the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme (see Clause 22.09 and Clause 55 assessments below and attached to this report).

91. Inconsistent with the existing neighbourhood character

The size and scale of the development is consistent with the preferred neighbourhood character set out in Clause 22.09. Furthermore, the proposal is consistent with the identified future character as set out at Clause 22.09-3.3 Incremental change areas (General Residential Zone Schedule 1) as well as responding to the preferred housing typology of medium density development.

1. As envisaged within the design principles for bulk and built form at Clause 22.09-3.3, the design response is provided with separation between the dwellings at the upper level, retains an existing spine of open space to the rear and positions the higher elements of built form towards the front and centre of the site.

92. Loss of landscaping and the removal of existing canopy trees

As demonstrated within the landscaping plan provided alongside the application, the development provides a landscaped character that is compatible with the existing and preferred neighbourhood character of the area. Side and rear boundary landscaping is provided within each area of private open space, as well as within the front setback and along the vehicular accessways. Each private open space area on site is provided with at least one canopy tree, with a minimum planting height of 1.5 metres.

The site previously contained several canopy trees within the title boundaries. All trees have since been removed, with the site devoid of any vegetation at present. Through the application process, it was determined that the trees did not require a planning permit or a local law permit for their removal. As stated above, the development is provided with a total of five (5) new canopy trees (to be planted at a minimum height of 1.5 metres) in accordance with the landscaped plan.

93. Inadequate parking provided

The proposal provides for car parking on site that meets the minimum car parking requirements of Clause 52.06-5. As per Clause 52.06-5, a dwelling requires one (1) car parking space to each one or two-bedroom dwelling (with studies or studios that are separate rooms counted as a bedroom), plus one (1) car parking space for visitors to every 5 dwellings for developments of 5 more dwellings.

Each dwelling has two bedrooms requiring one (1) car space per dwelling. The development provides each dwelling with one (1) single car space.

As the proposal is for less than 5 dwellings, no visitor car parking space is required or provided on the site. A full assessment of Clause 52.06 can be found in Attachment 4.

94. Increased traffic along the street

The proposal complies with the design principles of Clause 52.06-9. Access to the site is considered appropriate, utilising the existing crossover with visibility lines for safe entry and exit of the site.

The application was assessed by Council's Transport Planning team who did not raise concerns regarding any increase of traffic or traffic hazard as a result of the proposed development. It is considered that the existing road network is capable of supporting the minor increase in vehicle movements and would not impact on the ability for emergency vehicles to access the site or surrounding properties.



Assessment

Use

95. As outlined in Clause 32.08-2 (General Residential Zone, Schedule 1), a 'Dwelling' is listed as a Section 1 use and does not trigger a planning permit for the use. However, a planning permit is required for the development, which is discussed below.

Development

Planning Policy Framework / Local Planning Policy Framework.

- 96. With regard to the above preferred character, the proposal delivers on the objectives of clauses 15.01 (Urban Environment) and 21.05-1 (Built Form), which require development to respond to urban design, character, streetscape and landscape issues. The development includes adequate side and rear setbacks for landscaping opportunities, a strong design theme that reinforces the residential nature of the area and the incorporation of other measures to minimise visual impacts and amenity concerns.
- 97. The subject site is located within an established residential area and is well suited for the development of medium density housing given that the site is located in Noble Park within easy walking distance of many community facilities and public transport, as required by the objective of Clause 16.01-1S Housing Supply.
- 98. The proposal also seeks to reduce pressure on the urban fringe by providing three (3) dwellings where previously only one (1) existed through the redevelopment of the site, thereby ensuring that the housing required for the growing population is facilitated in accordance with the strategies of Clause 11.02 Managing Growth. The proposal also provides housing choice that meets the needs of the community, in accordance with Clause 16.01-1R Housing Supply Metropolitan Melbourne.
- 99. The proposal's consistency with the identified future character and preferred built form also means that it is in accordance with Clause 21.05-1 (Urban design, character, streetscapes and landscapes) and Clause (21.04-1 Housing and community), which reinforce the expectation for development to achieve high quality outcomes that has regard for the surrounding environment and built form.

Clause 22.09 - Residential Development and Neighbourhood Character Policy

- 100. Clause 22.09 (Residential Development and Neighbourhood Character Policy) identifies existing character, preferred future character and provides design principles across three 'future change areas': Substantial, Incremental and Limited.
- 101. The subject site forms part of the 'incremental change area'. The 'identified future character' outlined under Clause 22.09-3.3 states the following:
 - 'The future character of Incremental Change Areas will evolve over time to contain a greater proportion of well-designed and site responsive medium density infill development that respects the existing neighbourhood character. Future density will be at a lower intensity than in Substantial Change Areas, but a higher intensity than in Limited Change Areas.'

- 'Residential development will comprise well designed houses, townhouses, units and dual occupancies of up to two (2) storeys with main living areas generally on the ground level. Residential development will give particular consideration to providing appropriate setbacks and private open space areas and high-quality landscaping, including the planting of canopy trees, to protect the amenity of adjoining dwellings and to contribute to the landscape character'.
- 102. Design principles for all residential development are set out at Clause 22.09-3.1 and the design principles for the incremental change areas are set out at Clause 22.09-3.3.
- 103. The proposal for a double storey dwelling to the rear at this location responds to Clause 22.09 and is an acceptable design outcome for the following reasons:
 - The visual impact of Dwelling 3 does not adversely affect the identified future character of the area, as envisaged at Clause 22.09-3.3 Incremental Change Areas.
 - The site directly opposite Dwelling 3 to the west contains an existing aged care facility and is not a sensitive backyard interface.
 - The proposal will not adversely result in any overshadowing and overlooking onto the adjoining properties to the north and south and maintains the amenity of these sensitive interfaces.
 - The rear of the site is provided with landscaping, as well as a canopy tree within the secluded private open space of Dwelling 3. The first-floor level of Dwelling 3 does not require excessive screening or landscaping from the adjoining properties.
 - The upper floor level of Dwelling 3 is a provided with minimum setbacks of 3.105 metres to the west, 3.779 metres to the north and 6.165 metres to the south (opposite existing sensitive interfaces)
 - The proposal meets all design principles within Clause 22.09-3.1 and 3.3, with a full assessment against Clause 22.09 included at Attachment 3 of this report.

Clause 55 - Two or more dwellings on a lot and residential buildings

104. The proposal has been assessed against all of the objectives and standards of Clause 55, as well as the variations in Schedule 1 to the General Residential Zone. The development meets all objectives and standards of Clause 55, with an assessment against Clause 55 provided at Attachment 5 of this report.

Car-Parking

Clause 52.06 - Car Parking

- 105. The proposed development provides three (3) on site car parking spaces.
- 106. As per Clause 52.06-5, a dwelling requires one (1) car space to each one or two bedroom dwelling and two (2) car parking spaces to each three or more bedroom dwelling (with studies or studios that are separate rooms counted as a bedroom, plus 1 car parking space for visitors to every 5 dwellings for developments of 5 more dwellings).
- 107. As each dwelling has two (2) bedrooms, one (1) car parking space to each dwelling is required.
- 108. No visitor parking is required or provided.
- 109. The number of car spaces for Dwellings 1 to 3 (inclusive) complies with the minimum requirements pursuant to Clause 52.06.
- 110. The application has been assessed against the design standards of Clause 52.06-9, with the proposal complying with the design standards. The assessment against Clause 52.06 is provided at Attachment 4 of this report.



Vegetation and Tree Impact (Site and Surrounds)

- 111. The site contains canopy trees which would be removed for the proposed development. These trees do not require a planning permit nor a Local Law permit for removal.
- 112. It is considered that, subject to conditions of permit, the submitted landscape plan provides an appropriate replacement landscaping outcome, with canopy trees in the front and in the rear yards of each dwelling and smaller plantings along the accessways and along the side and rear boundaries.
- 113. An updated landscape plan should be requested requiring the canopy trees to be native and trees species selected from the City of Greater Dandenong Tree Selection and Planning.

Environmentally Sustainable Development

- 114. The proposal complies with the requirements of Clause 22.06 by providing a Sustainable Design Assessment (SDA), a Built Environment Sustainability Scorecard (BESS) and a Stormwater Calculation, all completed by qualified professionals.
- 115. The provided BESS score complies with a score of 52% for best practice encompassing the full life of the build and identifying the methods used for the best environmental performance outcome. Having regard to the sites opportunities and restraints, the proposal has included the necessary water tanks, and roof catchment areas, sufficient energy star ratings for fixtures and heating and cooling systems.
- 116. The referral response from Council's ESD/Sustainability team identified that the submitted plans satisfied ESD requirements. However, the SDA would require minor alterations which could be conditioned. Conditions have been included to require these details on the plans to be updated, as well as relevant notations to be updated as required

Conclusion

- 117. Subject to conditions, the proposed development of three (3) dwellings is considered acceptable and is of an appropriate design response in terms of height, scale, setbacks, private open space, car parking and landscaping with minimal amenity impacts on the adjoining residential properties and surrounding area.
- 118. The application has been assessed against the relevant sections of the Greater Dandenong Planning Scheme, including the Planning Policy Framework, Local Planning Policy Framework and Municipal Strategic Statement as set out in this assessment. It is considered that the application complies with these policies, and it is therefore recommended that the proposal is approved with conditions.

Officer Recommendation

That Council resolves to issue a Notice of Decision to grant a permit in respect of the land known and described as 34 Shepreth Avenue NOBLE PARK VIC 3174 for the purpose of the development of the land for three (3) double storey dwellings, in accordance with the plans submitted with the application subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Before the development starts, amended plans to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority must be submitted to and approved by the Responsible Authority. The amended plans must be drawn to scale with dimensions. The amended plans must be generally in accordance with the plans submitted and assessed with the application but modified to show:
 - 1.1. The TPZ and SRZ radii of all retained trees located within title boundaries and the adjoining lots;
 - 1.2. Dwelling 2's habitable room window facing south associated with bedroom 2 provided with obscure glazing to a minimum 1.7 metres above the finished floor level;
 - 1.3. Obscure glazing must be clearly shown on the elevations via dotted glass and must match the annotations on the first floor plan;



- 1.4. A revised Sustainable Design Assessment (SDA), in accordance with Condition 7;
- 1.5. Marked up location of the proposed 80 m2 permeable driveway, as per the SDA;
- 1.6. Annotation for the provision of door catches to all doorways within internal breeze pathways, as per the SDA and BESS IEQ Credit 2.2;
- 1.7. Specification of all windows as operable as per BESS Credit IEQ 2.2;
- 1.8. Any other measures associated with the revised SDA;
- 1.9. A landscape plan in accordance with Condition 2;
- 1.10. A Tree Protection Management Plan (TPMP) in accordance with Condition 9;
- 1.11. An annotation stating, "Letterboxes and all other structures (including visually obstructive fencing and landscaping) must be constructed to a maximum height of 900mm or relocated clear of a splayed area (2m x 2.5m) along the frontage road at access points in accordance with Dandenong Planning Scheme Clause 52.06-9."

When approved, these plans will be endorsed and will form part of the permit.

- 2. Before the approved development starts, and before any trees or vegetation are removed, an amended landscape plan to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority must be submitted to and approved by the Responsible Authority. The amended landscape plan must be prepared by a person or firm with suitable qualifications to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority, drawn to scale with dimensions and 3 copies must be provided. The amended landscape plan must be generally in accordance with the landscape plan submitted with the application but modified to show:
 - 2.1. Plans to accord with Condition 1 of this permit.
 - 2.2 The TPZ and SRZ radii of all retained trees located within title boundaries and the adjoining lots; and
 - 2.3 All canopy trees must be a native tree species selected from the City of Greater Dandenong Tree Selection and Planning.

When approved, the amended landscape plan will be endorsed and will form part of this permit.

- 3. The provisions, recommendations and requirements of the landscape plan must be implemented and complied with to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 4. Landscaping in accordance with the endorsed landscaping plan and schedule must be completed before the building is occupied.
- 5. Except with the prior written consent of the Responsible Authority, the layout of the land and the size, design and location of the buildings and works permitted must always accord with the endorsed plan and must not be altered or modified.



- 6. Except with the prior written consent of the Responsible Authority, the approved building must not be occupied until all buildings and works and the conditions of this permit have been complied with.
- 7. Prior to endorsement of the plans under Condition 1, the applicant is to submit a revised Sustainable Design Assessment (SDA) to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority. The revised SDA must be in accordance with the design initiatives and recommendations specified in the approved Sustainable Design Assessment (prepared by Melbourne Sustainability Consultants, dated 08 February 2024), but modified to include:
 - 7.1. Preliminary energy efficiency assessment (NatHERS) rating for all dwellings. The revised energy rating assessment must achieve the average target rating of 6.5 stars, with the assumptions, results and preliminary certificates included in the appendix of the SDA
 - 7.2. Revised WSUD report with proposed location of 80sqm permeable driveway as per SDA
 - 7.3. Submission of a revised BESS assessment that includes:
 - 7.3.1. Revised Management Credit 2.2: once the preliminary NatHERS rating is complete;
 - 7.3.2. Revised energy efficiency section inclusive of updated energy rating NatHERS inputs.
 - 7.4. Any other measures in accordance with Condition 1 of this permit.

When approved, the amended SDA will be endorsed and will form part of this permit.

- 8. The provisions, recommendations and requirements of the endorsed SDA must be implemented and complied with to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority. The endorsed SDA and supporting documentation must not be altered without the prior written consent of the Responsible Authority.
- 9. Prior to the endorsement of the plans under Condition 1, the applicant is to submit a Tree Protection Management Plan (TPMP) report (including a Tree Protection Plan annotated and to scale), using the Arboricultural Impact Assessment prepared by TMC Reports (April 2022) to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority. The TPMP must:
 - 9.1. Depict and annotate tree protection requirements at each stage of the development process to ensure all trees to be retained are adequately protected and remain viable in the landscape;
 - 9.2. Trees accurately located and numbered as per the arborist report with TPZs and SRZs represented to scale;
 - 9.3. A clear image of trees required to be retained prior to commencement of works;
 - 9.4. The type, installation and maintenance of tree protection fencing;
 - 9.5. Requirements for movement in/out and throughout the site by vehicles, machinery equipment and workers that may affect management of any TPZ;
 - 9.6. The protection of trunks and crowns of any specified tree;



- 9.7. Specific details of any works proposed within any TPZ and how arboricultural impacts will be mitigated;
- 9.8. How tree crowns will be managed, including any pruning requirements;
- 9.9. Excavation within or near a TPZ;
- 9.10. Specific methodologies and management for installation of services including, but not limited to, gas, electricity, telecommunications, storm water and sewerage;
- 9.11. Maintenance of TPZs in accordance with AS 4970-2009, including mulching, watering and prohibited activities;
- 9.12. Remedial works as required;
- 9.13. Schedule of Project Arborist inspections; and
- 9.14. The TPMP must include a program to implement the proposed measures before (including demolition), during and until completion of construction.

When approved, the TPMP will be endorsed and form part of this permit.

- 10. The tree protection measures set out in the TPMP must be implemented to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority, unless by prior written consent of the Responsible Authority.
- 11. Any building footings located within the Tree Protection Zones must be constructed using a tree sensitive design (e.g. a pier and beam with the beam at grade, screw piles, a waffle pad or a slab without an edge beam). The locations of all pier holes within the Tree Protection Zones must be identified and hand dug under the supervision of a qualified Arborist to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 12. Provision must be made for the drainage of the site including landscaped and pavement areas, all to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 13. The connection of the internal drainage infrastructure to the Legal Point of Discharge (LPD) must be to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 14. Collected stormwater must be retained onsite and discharged into the drainage system at pre-development peak discharge rates as stated in the LPD approval letter. Approval of drainage plan including any retention system within the property boundary is required.
- 15. Before the approved building is occupied, all piping and ducting above the ground floor storey of the building, except downpipes, must be concealed to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 16. Except with the prior written consent of the Responsible Authority, floor levels shown on the endorsed plan/s must not be altered or modified.
- 17. Before the approved building is occupied, the development must be provided with external lighting capable of illuminating access to each garage, car parking space and



pedestrian walkway. Lighting must be located, directed and shielded to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority so as to prevent any adverse effect outside the land.

18. Before the approved building is occupied, the obscure glazing to the windows shown on the endorsed plans must be provided through frosted glass or similarly treated glass. Adhesive film or similar removable material must not be used.

All glazing must at all times be maintained to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.

19. Before the approved building is occupied, the privacy screens and other measures to prevent overlooking as shown on the endorsed plans must be installed to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.

All privacy screens and other measures to prevent overlooking as shown on the endorsed plans must at all times be maintained to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.

- 20. Before the approved building is occupied, all boundary walls in the development must be constructed, cleaned and finished to the satisfaction of the Responsible Authority.
- 21. This permit will expire if:
 - 21.1. The development or any stage of it does not start within two (2) years of the date of this permit, or
 - 21.2. The development or any stage of it is not completed within four (4) years of the date of this permit.

Before the permit expires or within six (6) months afterwards the owner or occupier of the land may in writing request the Responsible Authority to extend the expiry date.

The owner or occupier of the land may in writing request the Responsible Authority to extend the expiry date to complete the development or a stage of the development if:

the request for the extension is made within twelve (12) months after the permit expires; and

the development or stage started lawfully before the permit expired.

Notes

- A drainage plan approval fee is to be paid to Council prior to the issue of approved drainage plans. Please contact the Civil Development department for the current schedule of fees.
- Any works undertaken within the road reservation and easements will require the developer to obtain a Civil Works Permit from Council.
- Prior to works commencing the developer will need to obtain an Asset Protection Permit from Council.
- A Building Approval is required prior to the commencement of the approved development. This planning permit does not constitute any building approval.
- Approval of any retention system within the property boundary is required by the relevant building surveyor.



- Before commencement of the development occurs, the applicant should contact the City of Greater Dandenong's Civil Development and Design Unit regarding legal point of discharge, new crossings, building over easements, etc.
- As this is an established site, the proposed internal drainage should be connected to the existing legal point of discharge. The applicant may apply for local drainage information, if available; otherwise on site verification should be undertaken by the applicant.
- A Vehicle Crossing Permit must be obtained from Council for all vehicular crossings prior to construction of the crossings. You may be required to apply for a Asset Protection Permit from Council's engineering services. 3 PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

Question

Phillip Lamaro, Dandenong

In September last year, Greater Dandenong City Council and the Mayor both advised that during Council meetings, to be asked to stand for the prayer and not to be asked to stand for an acknowledgement of country could be perceived as giving significance to one over the other. Council advised that in future it would be asked to stand for both, as both deserved to be given the same respect. At the Council meeting dated Monday 26 August 2024, people were asked to stand for the prayer but not for the acknowledgement of the First Nations people.

Has Council changed their view on giving both the same respect by asking for attendees of the Council meeting to stand for both the acknowledgment of country to the traditional custodians of the land and for the prayer?

Response

Andrew Foley, Executive Director Corporate Development

Council's Governance Rules only require Councillors to stand when speaking.

While Councillors and attendees may be invited to stand for the acknowledgement of Country and/or Prayer, it is entirely up to each individual to decide if they choose to do so or not.

Question

Phillip Lamaro, Dandenong

The Children's Court was built in Dandenong and opened over a year ago on Stud Road, Dandenong. Currently, temporary fencing has been placed around this site to protect the safety of the children attending the court. Earlier this year, Council advised that State Government promised to build a pedestrian crossing at this site and install safety barriers.

After a year the temporary barriers are still in use. The temporary barriers do not give the same level of safety as the proposed fencing and walkway will do. So, I would like to ask Council, as this is a safety issue concerning children and a risk of a child fatality on a busy road, can Council please give an update of the status of when this will be installed to protect the children from risk of injury or a fatality?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

The traffic signals on Foster Street, Dandenong outside the court will be delivered by Court Services Victoria, and we have been advised they have been in ongoing discussions and design development with the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP), who manage the road at this location.

Council has not received an update on the project for several months, and we will seek further update on the project shortly.

Question Susan Smith, Dandenong

Since I live in the Dandenong Cleeland Ward, and I like to think Council is spending our money wisely. In the past few weeks the street next to where I live, Gooding Court, Dandenong which has maybe 20 homes, some apartments the street was blocked off by several huge trucks including a water truck. The cost of these trucks plus the manpower and water must be expensive, maybe in the thousands of dollars to hire.

To my surprise all they had to do was plant several gum trees along the nature strip and presently there is a mature gum tree which is messy for whoever lives next to it and maybe the root system and need for trimming could be expensive with it growing over 3 metres. I would have thought to plant those small trees could easily have been done by a couple of people using a utility.

This is what the gardeners used recently where I live at Valley Village Mews, where I noticed the utility had about 12 young trees in it ready to plant. Due to huge gum trees planted along David Street, Dandenong toward Estia Health Valley View, I tripped over fracturing my arm as the roots had uplifted the pathway and I was responsible for the medical treatment afterwards. As only certain types of trees near powerlines are wise to plant and best no larger when mature than 3 metres.

What is the name of the types of gum trees planted recently in Gooding Court Dandenong, so I will be able to find out myself whether they are specialty types for under powerlines and not the types to become a problem due to their size, need for expensive trimming of dangerous branches or likely to uproot the footpaths?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

The recently planted street trees within Gooding Court, Dandenong are Coral Gums (*Eucalyptus torquata*). Suitable for small gardens and streetscapes, Coral Gums are a small, compact, evergreen tree suitable for planting under powerlines.

In general Council plants the right tree in the right location. In selecting suitable street tree species many factors are taken into consideration including; the available space below and above ground, drought, compaction, pollution, waterlogging and trees ability to establish and grow without onerous maintenance requirements.

This also extends to planting smaller species under power lines to negate the requirement for line clearance pruning. The Coral Gums within Gooding Court, Dandenong will be under establishment maintenance for two (2) years which includes regular watering over the warmer months.

Question

Susan Smith, Dandenong

One of the unanswered questions from the Dandenong Community Hub Co-Design workshops in February was whether the end of trip facilities, which were only proposed for staff could be made accessible to ordinary residents. What is the current architect's view?

Question

Susan Smith, Dandenong

Recently in driving around the Cleeland Ward Dandenong, it has come to my attention that possibly immigrants who have vacated their apartments have been unaware, maybe due to lack of information on a regular basis being given to them in writing when moving into their places that they can call a number to have as I believe they are entitled to of free hard rubbish removal so many times per year so when they vacate they can have what they don't want removed.

So many places outside apartments all over the ward in Dandenong have just put things they no longer need on the nature strip and with the heavy winds recently some of the items have blown onto the footpath and roads causing hazards to people walking or driving by. Also, it is unsightly and would put people wanting to move into a decent apartment off from moving into the ward.

Many immigrants must do not have vehicles suitable for removal of their hard rubbish and may be struggling financially unable to afford to have their hard rubbish removed when vacating their homes, and may not know it is illegal to dump your rubbish the way it often is left, it must eventually be costing the Council more to have to eventually remove the rubbish after it sitting around for months. So, to educate the people in that ward especially in the variety of languages necessary upon them moving into their apartments.

Could Council ensure that the landlords are given printouts to give the tenant with a phone number to have hard rubbish removal lined up when about to vacate and the landlords be made responsible for hard rubbish removal legally and made to pay for it to be removed if a mess was left next to their property by their tenants?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

Waste and Cleansing Officers are actively monitoring and addressing the ongoing issue of illegal dumping of waste throughout the municipality.

We are particularly aware that Multi Unit Development Sites (MUDS) are problematic with regards to dumped rubbish due to our highly transient community.

Council currently has two (2) dedicated Property Liaison Officers who play a crucial role in addressing this issue. They maintain regular communication with owners' corporations and property managers, provide them with information as requested and distribute targeted educational materials regularly to address these issues.



While education is important, we increasingly recognise that behavioural changes are necessary as well. This includes encouraging residents, property managers and landlords to avoid dumping waste on nature strips, especially in areas with high unit turnover.

Waste and Cleansing Officers also collaborate closely with the Local Laws team to investigate illegal dumping incidents. However, without evidence of where the waste came from or who dumped the waste recouping cost for collection is challenging.

We are continuing to communicate with owners' corporations and property managers to distribute that information.

If residents see hard rubbish at a particular address, can this be reported to Council and cleaned up?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

One of the unanswered questions from the last Dandenong Community Hub co-design workshop in February 2024 was the possibility of leveling the site to avoid the internal stairways at different levels and terraced steps into the building from the Stuart Street side. When will Dandenong residents find out the answer to that question?

The other issue with the proposed terraced steps into the Dandenong Community Hub building is if they are in part of the open space allocated to the hub. If these steps unfortunately persist, will they be included in the open space allocation for the hub as these steps are not usable open space?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

Cristian Abarca, Keysborough

I am the president of the Keysborough Soccer Club. We have close to 300 kids playing for our club, so are connected to almost 1000 Greater Dandenong residents, including parents and siblings of our players.

We have heard a lot of talk lately about the proposed South East Sports Hub (SESH) and we want to say that we are a big supporter of the project. We understand there is still doubt as to whether or not the SESH will be built. But what is not in doubt is that our club, like many other sporting clubs in the City of Greater Dandenong, are struggling to cater for the amount of kids that want to play because we simply do not have access to enough grounds.

What other plans does Council currently have to build more sporting facilities in the municipality? Because we can not afford to turn away kids that want to play sports.

Response

Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening

Council continually commits significant resources to sporting infrastructure across the City.

Council acknowledges the success of the Keysborough Soccer Club, based at Coomoora Reserve. Council has worked with the Club and invested significant capital in the reserve in recent times to support their growth. This includes the installation of new 100 lux lighting for the three (3) soccer fields, and future planned sub surface drainage works to increase opportunities for participation.

Council have also invested in infrastructure improvements for soccer in recent years such as the new synthetic soccer field at Ross Reserve, upgraded the lighting on the east oval at Thomas Carroll Reserve, upgraded lighting at Frederick Wacher Reserve etc.

Council officers work with all clubs and Football Victoria to discuss the growth and ongoing infrastructure needs of soccer. Officers will reach out to the club shortly to discuss any concerns.

Question

Scott Peters, Dandenong

I have noticed Dandenong CBD have no public electronic car charging stations unlike most other areas. Can Council explain why no public electronic car charging stations are in central Dandenong and when and where do Council plan to install them?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

Council updated its electric vehicle charging policy in 2022. The aim of the policy was to make it as attractive as possible for electric vehicle charging infrastructure providers to install within public spaces in Greater Dandenong as possible. It allows us to offer them parking spaces free of charge, and subsidised power in some instances.

Since then, Council officers have been in discussion with electric vehicle charging providers for the anticipated 3rd party delivery of electric vehicle charging infrastructure within the municipality within the next 12-24 months.

The exact locations will be driven by the suppliers, market demand and with Council guidance.

Question

Roz Blades, Noble Park

Would the Council's Regulatory Services staff please monitor the daily chaos at pick up time in Arena Square and Wallarano Drive, Noble Park? Also known as the Wallarano Park Primary School street carpark!

Could you also work with the Wallarano Primary School so that they can advise parents in their newsletter that they can park in the Noble Park Football Club and they can walk safely from Moodemere Street, Noble Park behind the car parking area and straight into the school instead of in front of the cars. At pick up time cars are parked in front of no standing signs on both sides of the road, preventing cars from reversing out safely. Additional to which there are cars parked behind the already parked cars. As a result of this, traffic cannot move and is unable to turn left from Wallarano Drive into Arena Square. Yesterday, there were cars parked outside no standing signs both signs of the road and over driveways. Would you be good enough to look at this very unsafe situation for children?

Response

Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening

I want to assure you that our Parking and Local Laws Compliance team takes safety around schools very seriously. Wallarano Drive is indeed a well-known area of concern regarding parking behaviour, and our teams make a concerted effort to attend to this location frequently.

Additionally, our Crossing Program Officer has been in touch with the school and recommended that a reminder about parking behaviour be included in the next newsletter. We will continue to have these conversations with the school and monitor the area for all.

Gaye Guest, Keysborough

These are recent statements from Council around our very high valued trees. "Greater Dandenong currently has a low level of canopy coverage, which when combined with its socio-economically disadvantaged community creates high levels of climate risk. The (proposed) site contains over 100 large trees that are identified as being of High/ Very High Value, and given the large urban renewal nature of the site, it has the opportunity to protect many of these significant trees" "The Council also called for mandatory tree canopy benchmarks for developments."

"The previous figure of 30 per cent canopy coverage for the southern region is not aspirational and a target date of 2050 is too late."

Why, when we have lost so many trees in this wind storm event last week are 9 healthy lemon scented gums that are only 9 years old (circa 2015) tagged to be removed because they were planted under power lines when we know this species grows taller than that and the trees at 51A Douglas Street not being saved as they are also very high valued heritage specimens and easily fall into these statements? The cost to the ratepayers to remove the 9 trees in Memorial Drive, Noble Park is devastating and Council need to decide on better tree selection so this error never happens again. The older the tree, the cheaper it is to maintain once it establishes offering environmental benefits and tree canopy coverage. When will they be unceremoniously removed and replaced?

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

The nine (9) Lemon Scented Gums (*Corymbia citriodora*), located in Ross Reserve adjacent to the skate park will be removed within the next 20 working days.

The trees have been identified for removal as we cannot continue to prune them safely and maintain the required clearances from high voltage overhead powerlines, according to Electricity Safety (Electric Line Clearance Regulation) 2020. Council has inherited many trees across the municipality some of which are inappropriate species or inappropriate for the location.

In general, Council plants the tree right tree in the right location. In selecting suitable tree species many factors are taken into consideration including; the available space below and above ground, drought, compaction, pollution and waterlogging and trees ability to establish and grow without onerous maintenance requirements.

This also extends to planting smaller species under power lines to negate the requirement for line clearance pruning. Council will investigate opportunities for offset planting within the precinct and surrounding neighbourhood with the view to plant in 2025.

Silvia Mastrogiovanni, Dandenong

When will the Dandenong Community Hub project page be updated with information on the project next steps decided at the Council meeting on Monday 26 August 2024?

Also, can it be updated with the latest version of the Dandenong Community Hub co-design that participants saw at Co-design workshop #2, along with a summed table of the different amounts of space allocated to different uses, i.e how many square metres are there of early years space, bookable meeting space, cafe space, makers space, community lounge space etc.? As Dandenong has many new arrivals that value unbookable, free space, the size of the community lounge is particularly important.

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

Council will update its website as soon as possible (September 2024) with the information and next steps from the Council meeting on the 26 August 2024.

Co-design workshops will recommence from February 2025. Any concept design details will be explored and discussed at these co-design workshops.

Once the concept design is finalised and endorsed by the Council, these plans will then be made available on Councils website.

Question

Kim Handley, Clyde

Upon attending the Dandenong basketball stadium on Friday night, I noticed a car parking shortage. With approx over 50 vehicles illegally parking on parklands and along Stud Road. Apparently, this happens multiple times during the week due to the dramatic shortage of car parks.

Is Council going to add more car spaces and as this happens repeatedly, does Council monitor this issue and give fines to all the illegally parked cars?

Response

Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening

The Dandenong Basketball Stadium is situated on a flood plain, which restricts our ability to construct additional parking spaces without approval from Melbourne Water.

However, I want to assure you that the Council's Parking Team actively monitors the area. They issue fines to vehicles that are parking illegally where applicable. We are committed to ensuring parking regulations are enforced to maintain safety and order in the area.

Ross Sutherland, Keysborough

The Keysborough Golf Club has been trying to relocate to a new site in Bangholme for many years. This move will safeguard the Club's future and create a new state-of-the-art course with gender-equitable and youth facilities. There has been a lot of commentary about this issue in recent times. It is my understanding that this Council has been a supporter of the Club's rezoning and relocation push for almost two (2) decades.

Can I please confirm that it is true that the Council has publicly and privately backed the Keysborough Golf Club's push to relocate the Urban Growth Boundary to include the current course in a General Residential Zone? Because I am concerned for the Club's long-term viability if the move does not proceed.

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

The Keysborough Golf Club first approached Council in 2004 seeking support to include its site in the Urban Growth Boundary, and to relocate the golf course elsewhere.

In 2004, 2012 and 2015 Council resolved to advocate to the State Government for the realignment of the Urban Growth Boundary to include the part or all of the Keysborough Golf Club within it, through the relevant planning processes that were occurring at that time.

The State Government has not acted on this advocacy to date, and Council has made no further decisions regarding the golf course since 2015.

It is also important to note that while Council has made resolutions regarding the existing golf club, it has not made any resolutions for the location or land for a South East Sports Hub, and will not do so until a formal application is received and assessed by Council.

Question

Matthew Kirwan, Noble Park

It is great that the traffic calming project is starting on Railway Parade, Noble Park starting with the new raised Liege Avenue/Railway Parade intersection.

a) Can information about the project be put on the Greater Dandenong website so there is information about the full scope of works and where all the new raised platforms will be located?

b) Is the new raised Liege Avenue/Railway Parade intersection going to be covered with red material as per similar raised platforms in Liege Avenue and other locations in Greater Dandenong? Currently drivers cannot see the raised platform until they get close because it not visually distinct.

c) Are new give way road markings going to be painted on at Liege Avenue/Railway Parade intersection? If entering the intersection from Liege Avenue, it is now unclear where to stop and give way.

Executive Summary

- This report details the tender process undertaken to select a suitably qualified and experienced contractor for the provision of Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) Inspection and Cleaning of Stormwater Pipes, Pits, Gross Pollutant Traps (GPT) and Associated Maintenance Works for the City of Greater Dandenong (CGD). This is a Lump Sum, and a Schedule of Rates based contract.
- 2. The initial term of the contract is three (3) years from the date of commencement with the option to extend the contract by two (2) one-year extensions.
- 3. This report recommends that Council awards Contract No. 2324-25 for CCTV Inspection and Cleaning of Stormwater Pipes, Pits, Gross Pollutant Traps (GPT) and Associated Maintenance Works to Total Drain Cleaning Services Pty Ltd trading as TDG Environmental (ABN 17 130 467 346).
- 4. The estimated expenditure for this contract over the initial three (3) years term is One Million, Eight Hundred and Eighty-Two Thousand and Forty-Seven Dollars (\$1,882,047.00) including GST.
- 5. Please note that confidential information is contained in the attachments, as circulated in the confidential section of the agenda attachments, in accordance with Section 66(2) (a) of the *Local Government Act* 2020, as the information relates to contractual matters and premature disclosure may be prejudicial to the interests of Council or other persons. This item has been included in the public agenda to facilitate transparency and accountability in Council's decision making. If discussion of the confidential information in the attachments to this report is required in order for the Council to make a decision, this item will be deferred to the confidential section of the agenda.

Background

- 6. Council undertakes proactive and reactive inspections, maintenance and renewals of its stormwater drainage assets and this contract is critical in making sure that these services are delivered in accordance with Council plans and programs. The Works Service Unit currently has two (2) separate contracts: one for Gross Pollutant Litter Trap (GPT) cleaning and another for drainage cleaning and CCTV inspections.
- 7. This new contract will merge these two (2) existing contracts into a single service, aimed at providing a more efficient solution and reducing both operational and administrative costs. Since both services achieve similar outcomes for residents of CGD, combining them will streamline operations. This consolidation was recommended as part of an internal service review conducted by the Team Leader Works and the Service Unit Leader Works and Fleet.
- 8. The work will consist of:
 - All labour, plant and equipment to carry out CCTV inspections;
 - All labour, plant and equipment to carry out clearing of drainage pipes and pits, GPT's (Gross Pollutant Litter Traps) including the lifting of heavy pit lids;
 - All labour, plant and equipment to carry out minor internal point repairs to drainage pipes;
 - Submission of all recordings, records, and reports of the CCTV inspections;
 - Collecting and disposing of all material removed from pits and pipes including GPT Litter Traps - recording of waste type/tonnage during clearing works and disposing at an approved Waste Management Facility;
 - Provision of evidence of inspection, clearing, blockages and point repairs (videos and/or digital photographs);
 - All safety requirements such as traffic control, confined space entry and OH&S compliances; and
 - Any other activities and items required for the satisfactory completion of all tasks associated with the work under this contract.

Tender Process

9. This tender was advertised in The Age Newspaper and on Council's website on Saturday 25 May 2024 and at the close of tenders at 2:00PM Tuesday 18 June 2024 twelve (12) tender submissions were received as follows:

- 11. The evaluation panel consisted of Council's Service Unit Leader, Infrastructure & Utilities Contracts Coordinator, Works Foreperson and Procurement Officer.
- 12. The Tenders were evaluated using Council's Weighted Attributed Value Selection Method. The advertised evaluation criteria and the allocated weightings for evaluation are as follows:

15. Evaluation Criteria 10 and 11 are given a Pass or Fail via Rapid Global (Council's Workforce Management Software – Health and Safety Compliance).



16. Each submission was assessed against all the evaluation criteria, to ensure that the tenderers met the standards and conditions required for Council contractors. A fail in any criterion would automatically exclude tenderers from further consideration for this contract. The weighted attribute points scores resulting from the assessment are shown in the following table:

- 18. At the completion of the tender evaluation process described above, the evaluation panel agreed that the tender submission from Total Drain Cleaning Services Pty Ltd t/a TDG Environmental ABN 17 130 467 346 would provide the best value for money outcome to Council for the works.
- 19. Relevant Experience/Track Record Total Drain Cleaning Services Pty Ltd
- 20. Over 16 years delivering asset inspection, service locating, stormwater and sewer asset maintenance services across Australia.
- 21. Have the capability to meet workloads with the resources specified in their submission.
- 22. Have demonstrated and proven experience in delivering the scope of works specified in the contract. They currently have several ongoing contracts with Councils across Melbourne.
- 23. Have been providing quality services for the cleaning and associated maintenance of stormwater assets for the City of Greater Dandenong over the past two (2) years.
- 24. The evaluation matrix and other supporting documents have been placed on the relevant tender file.



Financial Implications

25. This contract has an estimated spend of \$1,882,047.00 (inc. GST), which is accommodated within existing operating Council drainage cleaning and maintenance budgets.

Social Procurement

26. TDG Environmental ABN 17 130 467 346 have indicated that their business provides job readiness activities and employment to disadvantaged people currently '2.3% of TDG's workforce proudly identifies as being of Aboriginal descent'. TDG is 'committed to fostering a more inclusive and equitable workplace' and 'has implemented several initiatives aimed at increasing employment opportunities for disadvantaged individuals. Thes initiatives are part of TDG's Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).' TDG have also indicated that their RAP contains initiatives to promote engagement with Social Enterprises. In their submission it is stated 'TDG are currently working on our Reconciliation Action Pan with key initiative that include increasing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander supplier diversity to support improved economic and social outcomes by December 2024.' 'TDG is committed to supporting Indigenous communities through strategic partnerships with Indigenous-owned businesses.' TDG 'collaborate with The Traffic Controllers for traffic management services and Collar Talent Group for labour hire services'.

Local Industry

27. TDG Environmental ABN 17 130 467 346 are a business operating from a depot in Dandenong, they have 16 years of experience in their industry. Currently more than 15 employees reside within the Greater Dandenong Council boundary, TDG's local presence means that in their submission they have committed to significant local content. TDG have provided a value estimate of over \$1.7 Million per annum to be spent on labour, supervision and plant needed to service this contract. Additionally, in their submission TDG have indicated major items such as truck repairs and additional drain cleaning equipment will be purchased from multiple suppliers that also operate throughout the Greater Dandenong boundary. The estimated a value of these major items is \$1.3 Million.

Community and Stakeholder Consultation

28. Community and Stakeholder consultation not required.

Legislative and Policy Obligations

- 29. This report has considered Council's legislative and policy obligations (where applicable) as outlined in the Report Considerations section detailed in the front of this Agenda. The applicable obligations considered and applied are:
 - The Overarching Governance Principles of the *Local Government Act* 2020.



Conclusion

- 30. At the conclusion of the tender evaluation process, the panel agreed that the submission from Total Drain Cleaning Services Pty Ltd t/a TDG Environmental ABN 17 130 467 346 represented the best value outcome for Council and should be accepted due to:
- 31. Receiving the overall highest scoring tender submission. This scoring has been determined after considering and assessing financial factors, capability and resourcing, experience, and local, social, and environmental benefits;
 - Receiving the second lowest tendered price;
 - Their level of relevant experience working with other Victorian councils;
 - Their level of experienced staff and resources dedicated to delivering the services as per Council's specification and standards;
 - Receiving a satisfactory result for the Standard Financial & Performance Assessment (Procurement) Company Check undertaken by Corporate Scorecard; and
 - They received a Pass for their Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S) and Environmental Management Systems.

Officer Recommendation

That Council:

- 1. AWARDS Contract 2324-25 for CCTV Inspection and Cleaning of Stormwater Pipes, Pits, Gross Pollutant Traps and Associated Maintenance Works to Total Drain Cleaning Services Pty Ltd ABN 17 130 467 346 for an initial term of three (3) years;
- 2. NOTES that Council reserves the option to extend the initial contract term by two (2) one-year extensions; and

Executive Summary

1. This report outlines the process and evaluation for the contract extension for the experienced contractor for the provision of the **Facilities Maintenance and Management Services** for the City of Greater Dandenong (CGD).

expose the business, commercial or financial undertaking to disadvantage.

- 2. The Campeyn Group was awarded Contract 1718-01COL Facilities Maintenance and Management Services in 2018 in collaboration with Yarra Ranges and Cardinia Councils on an initial contract period of three (3) years with three (3) contract extension options of twentyfour (24) months. A Deed of Variation was executed in 2021 by the collaborative partners that the initial extension option term of twenty-one (21) months, second extension option term of thirty (30) months and the final extension option term of twenty-seven (27) months. The current contract expires on 31 December 2024. This contract was setup as a long-term contract (9 years including full options) as the supplier (Campeyn) has committed a large investment on resources and equipment to manage this major contract including setting up their offices in the municipality.
- 3. Given the overall duration of this contract to date this report recommends that Council approves and provides delegated authority to the CEO to execute the Facilities Maintenance and Management Services final contract extension with the **Campeyn Group** for a shortened period from 1 January 2025 to 31 March 2026 (fifteen months).



Background

- 4. The services provided encompass plumbing, electrical, HVAC, carpentry, and general maintenance including annual planned maintenance program (around \$1million); annual cyclical maintenance program including compliant Essential Safety Measures (ESM) and fire safety (about \$600K); and reactive maintenance activities over a large asset base of over 150 habitable buildings.
- 5. Throughout the duration of this partnership, Campeyn has consistently fulfilled all contractual obligations, met key performance indicators (KPIs), upheld superior customer service standards, and delivered optimal value for the Council. Furthermore, notable strides in continuous improvement (Asset Management & Emergency Evacuation Plans further detailed below) have been recognised and effectively implemented in recent years.
- 6. Campeyn Group is a now an entity of Knight Facilities Management (Australia) as of March 2024.
- 7. Campeyn Group continues to function under its existing ABN, with operations continuing the same way with Council under its existing contractual arrangement.

Key Points / Issues / Discussion

- 8. Please refer to the confidential attachment to this report for details of contractual / commercial rates, and benchmarking / cost comparisons to the industry rates offered to selected Councils within Victoria.
- 9. Campeyn consistently prioritises, ensuring that the Council receives optimal value for its investment while maintaining a high standard of quality workmanship at all sites. Collaborating with various contractors and vendors enables Campeyn to not only meet KPIs but also generate additional cost savings and other benefits for Council.
- 10. KPI Performance
- Refer to Building Maintenance Merit and Inspection Monthly Report May 2024 (Attachment 1) - Campeyn has consistently exceeded set KPI of 90% - On time completion of reactive maintenance requests.
 - Annual Planned Maintenance Program An Annual Planned Maintenance Program of around \$1million is implemented successfully within set budgets and timelines.
 - Essential Safety Measures (ESM) Compliance Council is 100% compliant on ESM servicing and a regime of maintenance programs is implemented by Campeyn to ensure compliance is maintained.
 - Annual Asbestos Removal Program Campeyn has successfully completed the annual planned asbestos removal projects at various sites.
- 12. Since Campeyn has been performing the contract, there has been a noticeable reduction in reactive facility maintenance services, indicative of a more proactive approach to asset management. This trend is evident in the year-to-date data, where the average spend has declined.
- 13. The contract has mainly revolved around facility maintenance, emphasising the completion of daily tasks as the top priority. However, to assist with the strategic oversight of Councils assets and future planning, Campeyn has invested \$250,000 in Asset Future, with no expense incurred by Council, to establish evacuation plans and asset data crucial for supporting the Council's Asset Management Plan (AMP). In addition, they conducted a pilot project for the Council, introducing 3D modelling via Skand at the Castle facility, all at no cost to Council.



Financial Implications

- 14. This contract had an anticipated spend in the order of \$3.3 million per year, which is accommodated within existing Council operating budgets for building maintenance.
- 15. Please refer to the 'Business Profile Financial and Performance Assessment' section of this report, which notes that –
- a. Overall, Campeyn Group has a strong book of current projects and under Knight Facilities Management (Australia) financial backing, would enhance positively its financial and technical resources going forward; thereby, maintaining the positive delivery standards of the contract.
- b. Knight Facilities Management (Australia) is a well-established facilities management company with a good track record and sound financial capability. It has a strong book of current projects with similar or larger contract values and have completed large Facilities Management contracts.

- 18. Council has conducted an independent standard financial and performance assessment on Campeyn Group and Knight Facilities Management (Australia). Please refer attached confidential Business Profiles.
- 19. The financial check on Knight Facilities Management (Australia), which is the larger group of which Campeyn is an entity of, shows the business has sound cash reserves and working capital, and has satisfactory financial capacity to undertake this contract.
- 20. Overall, Campeyn Group has a strong book of current projects and under Knight Facilities Management (Australia) financial backing, would enhance positively its financial and technical resources going forward; thereby, maintaining the positive delivery standards of the contract.
- 21. Knight Facilities Management (Australia) is a well-established facilities management company with a good track record and sound financial capability. It has a strong book of current projects with similar or larger contract values and have completed large Facilities Management contracts.
- 22. The financial assessment also provides consideration for Council to seek a cross guarantee with a related entity of adequate financial capacity (Knight Facilities Management Australia) for the duration of the contract, as well as participate in an ongoing financial monitoring regime during the course of the contract. Council will set this as a requirement of the extension to the contract.



23. Given the overall duration of the contract to date, it also is recommended that Council considers to go back out for market testing of these services as soon as practicable. On that basis, it is recommended that Campeyn Group be offered a shorter extension period of fifteen (15) months so as to allow sufficient time for Council to consider its delivery and service models, and prepare new contract specifications for future market engagement of any new contracts.

Conclusion

- 24. The Campeyn Group consistently delivers a high standard of quality workmanship, ensuring Council receives optimal value for its building assets and their significant investment in Asset Future would complement and support Council's Asset Management Plan (AMP) and strategic oversight regarding Council's building assets and future planning.
- 25. This contract has a high volume of reactive maintenance activities and Campeyn has consistently met KPI's on completion of tasks within set time frames. KPI's are achieved in ensuring 100% compliance on ESM (Essential Safety Measures) and satisfactory completion of annual Planned Maintenance and Asbestos Maintenance Programs.
- 26. The market rates provided to the Council for this contract reflect exceptional value and are notably lower than prevailing industry standards and sets a benchmark for cost-effectiveness within the municipal landscape and delivers inherent value for the Council under the current market condition.





Executive Summary

1. This report recommends that Council approves the twelve (12) month contract extension from 23 November 2024 to 23 November 2025 for Council's existing legal panel comprised of eleven (11) law firms.



Background

- 2. In November 2020, the current Contract 2021-21Q (A to K) was finalised for eleven (11) independent law firms following a tender process. These eleven (11) law firms were established as Council's preferred legal panel and were selected to ensure the provision of a comprehensive range of legal services across often diverse areas of law.
- 3. The initial contract period was for three (3) years from 23 November 2020 with two (2) contract extension options of twelve (12) months at Council's discretion.
- 4. The current contract period expires on 23 November 2024, with the contract terms stating that officers must notify the panel firms at least two (2) months in advance of extension period.
- 5. Business as usual (BAU) spend has been approximately \$1 million per annum over the last two (2) years.
- 6. Under Council's Procurement Policy 2021-2025, there is an exemption from general tender, proposal quotation and expression of interest for legal services.
- 7. The rationale supporting the one (1) year contract extension for Council's existing Legal Panel, is that the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) have advised that they are developing a new legal services panel on behalf of all Victorian councils, which has been requested by the sector.
- 8. More broadly, MAV are working with the local government sector to identify opportunities that not only add value but delivers greater procurement outcomes for their communities.
- 9. MAV has commenced reviewing the sector's legal requirements and Council officers have provided feedback to MAV regarding our legal service requirements.

1. The expected benefits of the Victorian local government legal services panel established by MAV are:

- a. Substantial time and financial savings
- b. Efficient and simplified supplier engagement process
- c. A diverse approved panel of key and local legal firms
- d. It addresses the collaboration requirements of the Victorian Local Government Act (2020)

Executive Summary

- 1. This report is the initial response to the Notice of Motion 36 Enhancing Disability Access.
- 2. This report outlines the outcomes from the 2020 public toilets audit, the prioritisation and cost estimation for upgrading the toilets.



Background

- 3. In response to Notice of Motion 36 Enhancing Disability Access, Council officers reviewed the 2020 audit of facilities and toilets and the associated action plan to prepare the response.
- 4. As part of 2020 audit, 185 locations were inspected. This includes 37 standalone toilet blocks, 52 sporting pavilions, 22 kindergartens and 74 other buildings managed by council.
- 5. The audits evaluated the toilets against the Building Code of Australia (BCA) and the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) standards, examining the level of compliance.
- 6. Based on the audit findings, the required interventions have been categorised into three main levels of work: minor, moderate, and major; (details in attachment)
 - Minor works (e.g., adjusting the height of rails): <\$20,000
 - Moderate works (typically retrofitting within an existing building without triggering additional building permit requirements): \$20,000 \$250,000
 - Major works (involving significant alterations to a building or replacement): >\$250,000
- 7. An action plan has been developed to include estimated costs, prioritisation with proposed timelines for implementation.
- 8. The prioritisations will be discussed with the stakeholders for feedback before being finalised.

Key Points / Issues / Discussion

- 9. Council is required to meet the minimum standards set by legislation, which are designed to address the needs of most people with disabilities. However, compliance with all legislation does not necessarily mean a facility is accessible for all due to the diversity of needs.
- 10. There are three main categories of accessible toilets designed to meet the diverse needs of different user groups.
 - **Ambulant toilets** are specifically designed for those with ambulant disabilities that do not require the extra space that is provided by Accessible toilets. Primarily, they are for those that do not require the use of a wheelchair, for example, those with sensory loss, arthritis or require the use of a walking frame.
 - Accessible toilets are specifically designed to provide enough space to accommodate wheelchair access and assistance when transferring from wheelchair to toilet. Accessible toilets include features such as lower mirrors and washbasins, contrasting toilet seat colour, grab rails and braille signage.
 - **Changing Places** facilities are larger than standard accessible toilets and have extra features and more space to meet the needs of people with disability and their carers.
- 11. Nine existing toilets have been designated for design or upgrades as part of the 2024-2025 Capital Budget.
- 12. Based on the cost estimation for different level of works (minor, moderate and major), it is estimated that:
 - up to \$240,000 is required for minor works across 12 toilets
 - up to \$4,000,000 is required for moderate works across 16 toilets
 - the estimation for the major works (anything over \$250,000) is not possible without a proper design.

Financial Implications

Executive Summary

6 REPORTS FROM COUNCILLORS/DELEGATED MEMBERS AND COUNCILLORS' QUESTIONS

I want to congratulate Noble Park United on their promotion this season. I know the people at Drina worked hard throughout the year, especially all the volunteers, to get the club running, organising training sessions and everything else that you could possibly think of.

What are the rules for abandoned vehicles in residential streets? In the interest of privacy, I will provide the location after this meeting. There has been an instance of an abandoned vehicle present for about six (6) months in a residential neighbourhood. That has started to attract some antisocial behaviour. The car windows are down and it has sustained all sorts of weather damage.

Please provide us with the location of the vehicle. We have a very active role and program around abandoned vehicles. Officers, as part of their standard rosters are viewing, infringing and moving on those vehicles as appropriate.

On Wednesday 28 August 2024, I attended the Community Conversations Springvale Revitalisation Action Plan with Deputy Mayor Cr Richard Lim OAM. I would like to thank the officers for their support with arranging this meeting. It was good to listen to residents firsthand about what their concerns are. I believe it was a productive meeting.

I also attended the 2024 Moon Festival and 75th anniversary of the Chinese National Day celebration last night (Sunday, 8 September 2024) with Mayor Cr Lana Formoso and Deputy Mayor Cr Richard Lim OAM. It was an enjoyable night to see all the different cultural presentations and to catch up with people generally. I attended other events, but they are the two (2) I want to highlight.

I would like to congratulate Mayor Cr Lana Formoso on her term. It has been a challenging year. Residents are maybe a bit grumpy because of the cost of living, which is not totally within Councils' control. It can be difficult to meet residents' expectations sometimes, but I believe you have acquitted your role well, and I hope that you have a well-earned rest after your Mayoral term finishes.

Question Cr Sean O'Reilly

I have a question around Council Advocacy priorities in State and Federal budgets, which we are currently reviewing for the for the forthcoming financial year. I would like to provide some feedback after having many conversations with people around the community. I thought there was one (1) issue missing that I think that people out there find important. The issue I wish to raise is to do with police numbers in Greater Dandenong. I commend the efforts of our police officers who do their best under difficult circumstances. However, based on conversations with local residents and traders, it is evident to me, and I believe to them, that the current number of police we have in our municipality is insufficient. This has impacted on response times and the overall quality of policing.

Knowingly, if you have only a limited number of people to do the job and many calls coming in, naturally it is difficult and the quality of response does suffer. For example, a trader in Springvale advised an incident was reported where men had entered their shop with machetes. They contacted the police and police advised they would attend in 3 hours. In Central Springvale I witnessed a fist fight 20 metres away.

A resident who lives near me advised of repeated hoon driving and excessively noisy vehicles. This resident has reported this to state Ministers. This resident is not shy in reporting these things and is at their wits end on getting a response to this. The key thing this Council should be advocating to both the Victorian and the Federal government, although, as we know, it is primarily a Victorian Government responsibility, is police resourcing in our municipality. The other things we have in our advocacy document are important, but speaking to people out on the street, this is what they want, this is what they are telling me.

Could we consider advocating for the allocation of more police resources to address the safety concerns in residential areas?

Comment

Cr Lana Formoso, Mayor

I would like to say a few words. Firstly, I hope that you did mention that at the police forum that you attended last week. I would be more than happy to write a letter to Victoria Police. If Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening would like to speak further to that, then she can respond.

In response to your concerns, and we know this is an issue across the State, not just Springvale, not just Greater Dandenong. I would like to commend Victoria Police because, interestingly enough, a few nights ago, there was a five (5) year old girl that went missing in Dandenong North. She was missing for over 2 hours, police and family were frantically looking for her and I happened to find her. I had Victoria Police in attendance within 6 minutes. Once they arrived, they were able to reconnect that child with their parents within 18 minutes. I do appreciate and understand where you are coming from, but I also want to highlight some of the incredible work that they are doing in our community. I wanted to thank them for that incident because, as a parent, that was extremely distressing and it was comforting to have Victoria Police in attendance and to reunite that child with their family.

Response

Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening

Certainly, safety is an absolute priority for our community. There is no debate around that. We do work very closely with Victoria Police. In a recent meeting that officers held with the senior leadership of Victoria Police in this municipality, they were really pleased to confirm they have managed to fill some long-term vacancies that have been in the municipality for quite some time.

In addition to what Mayor Cr Lana Formoso just mentioned, it is a Victorian Statewide issue. What we do know is it is not necessarily about the allocations not being there, it is about Victoria Police vacancies in terms of their overall staffing. I am pleased to report very soon that Springvale is about to relaunch its neighbourhood policing program, which involves four (4) dedicated officers out on the streets trying to rebuild some perceptions of safety and helping the community feel a lot safer. That is very positive.

Just last week, at our Councillor Briefing Session, which we will be sharing more at a Council meeting soon, we presented on Councils' new Community Safety Framework, which really talks to a joint effort with all providers, including local Council taking a role in how we support safety and improving perceptions of safety within our community.

Further response

Marjan Hajjari, Executive Manager Strategic Growth & Advocacy

Safety is one of our priorities and through the Council Plan engagement that we did this year, safety came up as a big priority. I ensure you as part of our advocacy priorities and action plans, we include safety. Increasing the number of Victoria Police officers might be one which I know Peta Gillies, Executive Director Community Strengthening is clearly working on.

We also look at the other aspects and the other actions that we can include. In terms of the upcoming State and Federal budget, we can look at that. As you know, it is a tight time frame, plus this probably would be better to look at it more comprehensively with the work of Community Strengthening. There are other things, like the safety framework that we are reviewing. I am happy to have further conversation with you if you have a particular kind of the recurse on that, but I think it may not be the best place for this coming budget conversation. This is definitely one of the biggest priorities as we go through our next steps of the advocacy.

Comment

Cr Sean O'Reilly

Firstly, I commend the police as well. It is an extremely difficult job. What I am arguing for is more police. I am not saying that the police are in any way inadequate, quite the contrary. They do an extremely difficult job under trying circumstances. Even more so when they do have, as the Director mentioned, missing people, and as police say, it is hard to get recruits. We have heard that for a while. But this must be resolved. We cannot continually say "it is hard to get police recruits". Is it to do with hours? Is it to do with their salary? That is a question for the Victorian Government to address? In terms of our advocacy, I am now asking the advice from the Directors on how this is progressed. Because the response I heard was that we might consider it for a future year.

I think Councillors and others around this Chamber, as they are speaking to more people, will be getting more concerns about community safety and police response. I believe, it might sound over simple when we have a whole lot of different frameworks and strategies. I believe we need more police and when we have more police, they can respond quicker and have the time to provide a better response. I want it on the record that this, in my opinion and I want this to progress, should be a top priority of our advocacy to the Victorian Government before we advocate for other things.

Cr Lana Formoso, Mayor

I will work with Marjan Hajjari, Executive Manager Strategic Growth & Advocacy and compose a letter together to send to Victori Police. If neither of us continue our careers in Local Government, let's join Victoria Police.

Question

Cr Rhonda Garad

I would like to follow up on a response that was given earlier regarding electric vehicles. As you are no doubt aware, our emergency strategy says that we will increase the uptake of electrical vehicles in the City of Greater Dandenong. In fact, we have the highest number of registrations each year of electric vehicles in the City of Greater Dandenong. We do because we have a factory.

Unfortunately, we have one (1) charger that is a non Tesla charger, and I know because that is the only charger I can use. That creates an enormous range of stress. We know from the figures that have been tallied, that the economic benefits of having chargers right in the middle of your City are very lucrative, because people need to leave their cars for a number of hours, and they will spend and eat and visit our City. It is good for the planet, but it is also good for the economy. Would the officer agree that our strategy, which we will be four (4) years into by the time we get one (1) charger, by the sound of it, agree that our strategy has not worked? We only have one (1), and it is in an Ampol station nowhere near the centre of the City.

Response

David Fice, Acting Executive Director City Futures

I do not think that the vehicle charging policy has not worked. Some time has passed since it was developed in 2022. Since then, Council has been working with private industry to understand the best way in terms of implementing not just one (1) charger, but a roll out across the municipality. I appreciate the frustration around wanting to see some of those charges sooner, and there are benefits that it does provide for the broader community. It is progressing, and we are expecting to see a roll out of third party charges over the next 12 to 24 months.

Question

Cr Rhonda Garad

We received some pleasing information about the inappropriate transfer station application that was put in at Frankston-Dandenong Road, which is the Green Wedge agricultural lungs of the Melbourne area. This proposal was going to put the most toxic substances in this green field state. It is very pleasing to hear that Council has refused that application and, in fact, emphatically refused it with 19 areas of failure.

This site, which continues to be problematic, it continues to have found that toxic waste is being dumped there, and that we have, as recently as two (2) weeks ago, more photos that more toxic waste has been dumped. We have an independent report to say that there is high level of toxic waste, including heavy metals. Unfortunately, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have found there is only low-level contamination, which we find extremely surprising, given that the independent report emphatically showed there was extensive and high-level toxic dumping there.

Where is the EPA report? Where was their testing done? Why is this operator allowed to continue to dump in this site, given the EPA have said that they have to remediate the site and remove the toxic waste? We see that this operator has had no interruption to their permit and there is no monitoring or assessment process to see what that operator is putting in. Despite two (2) reports showing that they are continuing to dump toxic waste right next to 600 older residents and to a waterway, nothing has been done to stop this. Why is that allowed?

Response

Sanjay Manivasagasivam, Acting Chief Executive Officer

This is an ongoing investigation through the EPA. The EPA have instructed the business owners to remove some of the soil and that has already commenced. It is an EPA responsibility. We are closely working with them to resolve that. For Council, any breach of planning matters, we will take action on, as such it is an ongoing investigation at this stage.

Further question

Cr Rhonda Garad

So, can you confirm that there is a monitoring process of what they are putting there at this moment? There is an adequate monitoring process?

Response

Sanjay Manivasagasivam, Acting Chief Executive Officer

Yes, that is correct. The EPA has got adequate monitoring policies and are ongoing monitoring that process.

Question

Cr Rhonda Garad

The Keysborough South levy, that a certain portion of residents (5000 dwellings) pay for the upkeep of 15% extra green space in the Keysborough South Ward, is a unique user pay system in our City. The questions that I have, received from many residents is, why will Council not provide detailed maps of where that 15% is?

The information we have been provided with shows that the football fields, the soccer fields, and the regional park have been included in that 15%, and yet they are not accessible to the residents in that ward. Those grounds are used by clubs and residents are not allowed to use them. In fact, fees are gathered which would pay for the upkeep. So, why are only a portion of residents paying for the upkeep of sporting fields and a regional park, which is the responsibility of Council. Also, retarding basins such as pencil park.

Is the 15% still there, given that the community hub and other structures have been taking over the green space? There are many unanswered questions.

Response

Sanjay Manivasagasivam, Acting Chief Executive Officer

Council officers are working on a detailed plan and will provide that when it is ready.

It has already been provided, but we are happy to clarify any other questions, so please send them through. We will provide a written response to those residents.

You have said that there has been a map sent out or there is a map in development? The map that has been sent out is of the whole of Keysborough South with houses and all. There is no detail in that map. So, are you saying another one is being developed?

Yes, we are working on a detailed map.

When can we expect that the residents will get access to that detail that is been developed?

On Thursday 5 September 2024, I attended the Citizenship ceremony. Congratulations to the 150+ new citizens.

As this is our last meeting, I want to congratulate everyone and thank the officers. We have been through a lot throughout 2020-2024. Congratulations to the first Mayor, Cr Angela Long, and myself as the first deputy mayor. We did achieve a lot. The Noble Park Revitalisation Board received a lot of support from State Government. We received over approximately 2 million dollars from them to support our projects. Thank you to the Noble Park Revitalisation Board. The board no longer exists, but we do still want to work with them on local projects. Congratulations to everyone who was involved.

We have had a lot of projects completed since 2020 in our municipality. To highlight a few, the Black Spot Program where we received a lot of funding from the Federal Government. The safety platforms are located at Bloomfield Road, Kingsclere Avenue, Yarraman Road, Railway Parade, Noble Park. We have the new Wachter Reserve playground. That is a great playground for our residents. We had the Activity Centre revitalisation at Noble Park. We have done the Noble Park Aquatic Centre. It was approximately 6.9 million dollars on that project, which is great for our residents to stay healthy. We had the 'Make Your Move' campaign for our Council. There is a lot of activity happening in Noble Park like the streetscape along Douglas Street and Leonard Avenue.

A resident in attendance tonight parks their car about 50 metres away from their residence. As we know, Metro Village, Dandenong has high-rise apartments with many units on one (1) block. This Council has entertained the idea of having permit car parking.

If you go to other Cities like South Melbourne and St Kilda, you will see signs that only cars with parking permits are allowed to park on some sides of the street. I think Council needs to have a good look at this. In the past, we never really had to, but areas that are now becoming like Metro Village. It is not fair to the residents who have to park their cars 50 metres away from where they live. Can Council officers please investigate that area, and then maybe have a look at other areas in the City of Greater Dandenong?

I have a question about the roll out of the Rainbow Libraries program. This was something that has attracted significant media coverage. I received three (3) or four (4) emails, some from cookers, some from normal residents, particularly given the comments that have come from the Herald Sun regarding the fact that the program was rolled out in Springvale. It was rolled out with Councillors, MPs and Ministers in attendance. The concern was around the targeting of five-year-old kids to identify what their gender is. To start so young, is almost weaponizing the kids and causing mass confusion with what is going on.

I did try and find the tool kit and found a lot of references to it. The standard media released from every Labor MP under the sun in the South East is saying how great the program is, without going into detail. The libraries that we have in the City of Greater Dandenong, in Australia's most multicultural municipality, in a municipality that is disadvantaged, it should be educational and helping them to learn and have access to internet, have access to literacy and numeracy standards. Rather than having woke ideology, where, if a five-year-old comes into the library, the query is immediately put on them of what they identify is. Can you explain what this program is, how it is being rolled out, what the City of Greater Dandenong's role is, and what we are intending on doing?

The program was rolled out by the Victorian State Government in the last few weeks. They hired the use of some of our space, as per any property hire that would access Springvale City Hall. In terms of what it means for the City of Greater Dandenong, we will look at and review what is contained within the tool kit. There is not an automatic commitment that we would adopt and roll it out. It was the State Government launching their product which we will review over time. We do have the LGBTQIA+ Advisory Committee going through the process now, post Council endorsing those terms of reference. So, I would suggest that might be relevant for that advisory committee to review once it is established.

I have three companies and obligations to my staff and to my family, with the recent health scare has been picking up significantly. My commitment of being able to deliver to my residents and the residents of the City of Greater Dandenong as a whole, is just getting too much and too significant for me to be able to continue.

Tonight, in the last Council meeting before Caretaker period I am not running for Cleeland or any other wards. At the age of 31 and I found last month, the first gray hair, and for those on my social media will see that photo. I am now ready to move on to the next chapter of my life in my career as well.

There will be no regular questions from Tim Dark from Keysborough. There will be no consistent question or attendance at Council meetings. I am at a point where my life has changed. My goals have changed and I believe that I have delivered everything I possibly can to the Council at this stage. I was elected to the Paperbark Ward at 23 years of age representing 43000 constituents. When I was first elected and walking the streets of Noble Park at 1am in the morning when I was unable to sleep due to being elected in this building where it was declared to the shock of many people that I was the very first person elected, succeeding Peter Brown. The heckling started as soon as that was announced and then over the eight years, getting to where I am today has been a significant learning curve but something that I have thoroughly liked. The battles, the fun, the entertainment, the traveling, the media, all the fun you could possibly have in the City of Greater Dandenong.

I have attended overseas international trips to China and to Sri Lanka on behalf of the Council, to see what is going on and representing Council by my own payment, there was no expenses to the rate payers before somebody comments to the Journal. There were many Master Plans that I came into this Council to deliver. One of the biggest goals I had when I was first elected was to deliver infrastructure as a key part of my Ward. The Ward had dilapidated infrastructure, no maintenance plans, no future goals. Clubs were saying they had a significant number of issues to do with the funding of the infrastructure, of fencing, of lighting of the sports grounds in the community facilities. Over the past eight years, particularly Park Field Reserve, Rowley Allan Reserve Coomoora Reserve, Ross Reserve Master Plan and many more. They reserve are looking phenomenal.

With the Council Elections upon us, I want to take this opportunity to reflect on my time as Mayor and also the past four (4) years of this Council.

We have worked hard and achieved so much and I want to highlight some of those achievements.

I want to begin by saying it has been an honour and a privilege to serve as a Councillor for the Noble Park North Ward for the past four years, and as Mayor of the City of Greater Dandenong for the past year.

I would particularly like to thank Cr Richard Lim OAM who has been a great Deputy Mayor, as well as the Chief Executive Officer Jacqui Weatherill and the executive team, who have all come on board during this term of Council.

I must also thank the Council officers who continue to work hard in support of our community.

Special thanks to Jo Thorn, Executive Assistant to the Mayor and Councillors. Jo's assistance and organisational skills have supported us to be at our best for the past four (4) years. She continues to be a great support to all of us.

I would also like to thank the dedicated and passionate community members I have met and worked with over the past four (4) years. Together we have worked to shape a more inclusive community that will bring great outcomes for future generations. Particularly volunteers and community leaders in our community groups, schools, kindergartens and Council volunteers. As Mayor, I have had the privilege of meeting so many of you and seeing firsthand the great work that you do.

I was born and raised in Dandenong and I have great pride in this community and all we have worked together to achieve. Over the term of this Council, we have contended with some big challenges. From the continued COVID pandemic, which almost postponed the last Council Elections, to the ongoing inflation and cost of living pressures experienced across our society.

I have given many speeches over the past year, and I almost always mention with pride that Greater Dandenong is the most culturally diverse municipality in Australia. A wonderful part of the role of Mayor is the privilege to preside over Citizenship ceremonies, where people take the final step in the migration journey, to formalise their full membership of our community. I have been pleased to preside over 9 ceremonies and confer Australian Citizenship on 1373 candidates over the past year. I want to first focus on some other highlights of my year as Mayor:

- We celebrated the completion of a number of projects at Ross Reserve, including the \$10 million Ross Reserve Pavilion, the synthetic soccer pitch and redeveloped Athletics Track. These projects took place over the term of this Council and it is great to see it all come together.
- We resolved to continue to deliver Disability and Aged Care Services to our community.
- Construction is well underway on the much-anticipated Keysborough South Community Hub.
- Council advanced work on the Dandenong Wellbeing Centre with that project out for tender right now. It is a credit to the unwavering commitment of this Council to this oncein-a-generation project for our community. It is a great legacy too for the new Council, who we expect to award a contract for construction very early in the new term.
- We introduced a dusk to dawn Cat Curfew and a Tree Protection on Private Local Land Law. This new law has contributed to our tree canopy increasing from 9 per cent in 2018, to 14 per cent this year putting us well on our way to reaching our target of 15 per cent coverage by 2028.
- The Revitalise Central Dandenong Project took a significant step forward with a recent State Government announcement of the approval of the Development Plan Overlay. This creates the opportunity for Council to progress plans for Revitalising Central Dandenong with more affordable housing, and a safe and vibrant precinct for our local economy and community to prosper.
- Our Council was one of nine to sign an agreement for the South East Metropolitan Advanced Wast Processing facility, which will see 95 per cent of household waste diverted from landfill and used to create a valuable energy source.

This year we implemented the Springvale Revitalisation Action Plan which includes a number of cultural, economic and public realm initiatives. This Action Plan follows on from works already carried out in this Council's term, including the completion of the revitalised Springvale Boulevard.

I was also elected as board member for the Victorian Local Governance Association by my fellow Councillors in Victoria.

Following a persistent, sustained advocacy campaign by Council the State Government announced funding for a Stud Road traffic safety project. This issue was particularly important to me and was a catalyst for me standing for election four (4) years ago, so I am particularly proud of this outcome. It will result in much improved safety for pedestrians, cyclists and other road users. We also secured the Department of Transport and Planning's agreement to reduce the speed limit from 80 km to 60 km on this very dangerous stretch of road. The last Council Election was held during the COVID pandemic, and while the construction of the Springvale Community Hub and Library was completed in the previous Council's term, it was officially opened to the public during our term. It was a very special celebration during a very challenging time for our community.

Greater Dandenong City Council continued to support our community throughout the pandemic, and during our first 12 months as a Council we faced many challenges. I am proud about how we supported individuals and businesses during the pandemic, including with financial support, food relief and material aid. As the world began to open up again, we continued to support their recovery.

During this Council's term we have continued to advocate to State and Federal Governments to address key issues facing the most vulnerable members of our Greater Dandenong community, including homelessness, poverty, gambling, and social and affordable housing.

The Local Government Mayoral Taskforce Supporting People Seeking Asylum continued their great work, along with the Back Your Neighbour advocacy campaign. Support for this work grows and there are now more than 40 local Council's supporting the campaign. This campaign has already had great success and continues to advocate for the rights of people seeking asylum.

We also continue our work to embed reconciliation across Council for our Traditional Custodians.

Other highlights over the past four (4) years of this Council include:

- The Noble Park Revitalisation Project, which has seen \$2 million dollars injected into rejuvenating the centre and reinforcing its village character through activations and public art projects;
- The completion of the state of the art gym at the Noble Park Aquatic Centre;
- The All-Abilities Playground at Ross Reserve; and
- Strong investment across sporting infrastructure, including the completion of the \$6 million re-development of Dandenong's WJ Crowe Pavilion, new netball courts at Springvale Reserve, tennis courts at Burden Park and Parkfield Reserve, as well as a number of other upgrades including better lights at sports grounds across the city.

Most importantly of all, I would like to acknowledge my greatest achievement in life. My beautiful sons, Luca and Hugo. You are my guiding stars, everything that I do is to help build a better future for you and for future generations. My entire family have stood by my side every step of the way to ensure I can best serve our community all whilst facing an incredibly challenging personal experience. My eldest son, Luca, was fighting for his life when he was diagnosed with leukemia in 2022 at the age of 9 whilst I continued to serve this community. Luca not only have you now beaten cancer, you have also taught me on this journey the true meaning of courage and that nothing is impossible through prayer and a positive mindset. Thank you to my family for the sacrifices you have made to help me lead and serve our community. I hope I have made you all proud.
