




# Children's Plan

Year 3 Action Plan Report 2023-2024





#### **Executive summary**

The vision of the **Children's Plan 2021–2026** is for children and their families to be valued, celebrated, respected and supported to reach their full potential. It was created in consultation with children, local service providers and a number of Council departments. This integrated approach values collaborating with children aged 0-13 years, as well as acknowledging the critical role that parents, carers and their extended families play in supporting the development of each child's education, health and wellbeing.


This report covers Council's progress on our annual actions for the third year of the Children's Plan, the period 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024, and highlights a number of key achievements.

The **Year 3 Action Plan Report 2023–2024** contains 75 actions stemming from five strategic objectives. These actions are the responsibility of many different Council departments, and the delivery of the plan is a collaborative effort. In 2023–24, we are tracking well, with 97 per cent of planned actions completed.

### Strategic Objective 1: Provide leadership and advocacy in planning for children and families

The City of Greater Dandenong has a central role to play in local infrastructure, service planning and the provision of high quality, sustainable services. Council's close proximity to the community means it is well-placed to be an advocate for community needs. Council works with all levels of government, various sectors, organisations, services and community members to create effective community outcomes.

The Municipal Early Years Infrastructure plan has been updated, based on population estimates, to take into account the demand for Pre-Prep programs.



About 400 families attended the Dad's Group initiative, designed to bring families together, giving fathers a chance to socialise, and connect them to resources, information, and support.

### Strategic Objective 2: Strengthen health and wellbeing outcomes for children and families

Health and wellbeing encompasses physical, emotional and mental health. Council supports positive health and wellbeing outcomes for children and families through:

- universal health services
- health promotion and prevention activities
- building resilience in children and strengthening families
- early intervention support services
- promoting social inclusion and connectedness.



Developed and distributed resources and videos to raise awareness of immunisation, among culturally diverse families (including Dari and Burmese translations), and 'Stay Strong and Deadly: Immunise Bubup', a resource for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.



Implemented two new programs to support newly arrived families with 'catch-up' immunisations.



Delivered 25 Supported Playgroups (engaging 180 families including 26 families via In-Home Family Support) and provided assistance to Community Playgroup Leaders who ran 32 community playgroups.

# Strategic Objective 3: Support engagement in learning, skill development and vocational pathways

Learning 'is a continuous process throughout life', children 'learn through a variety of formal and informal experiences within the classroom and more broadly in their home and in the community.' Council supports the provision of high-quality early learning and care services.



Preschool Field Officers collaborated with local early years services to support 270 children to participate in Kindergarten programs.

Over 8,000 children (Foundation, Grade 1 and Grade 2) received one-on-one reading assistance to support children's learning and development.



# Strategic Objective 4: Improve safety and accessibility for children and families to participate in the community

Council has an important role to play in supporting the safety of children and families from bullying, discrimination and in accessing public spaces and amenities throughout the municipality.



Festivals and Events delivered child-friendly activities at Council's 11 major events, including Noble Park Community Fun Day and Keysborough's Big Picnic, and the Children's Festival calendar.



Sensitive storytime sessions assisted 178 children with sensory processing or developmental challenges.



To support a culturally responsive workforce, 38 allied health professionals took part in the Balit Booboop Narrkwarren training and developed resource toolkits with Aboriginal Elders.



## Strategic Objective 5: Value active participation and engagement of children and families in the community

A child friendly city implements the *Convention on the Rights of the Child* (1990) to local communities in partnership with children. Central to the Child Friendly City concept is that children's 'voices and opinions are taken into consideration and influence governance, decision making at a local level including laws, policies, programs and budget to improve the lives of children and to create sustainable environments now and into the future.


